The English turf is to receive an accession in the person of Lord Chesman, brother of the Duchess of Westminster.

A number of trotting meetings on ice are to be held in Manitoba this winter. It is possible a circuit will be formed.

A. T. Young of Dundas, Ont., recently drove ninety miles during the winter of a yoke of oxen, the trip occupying three days.

J. M. Murray, the light-weight champion, offers to spar or fight any man in America with soft gloves for from \$500 to \$1000 a side at 130 pounds, either Marquis of Queensberry or London prize ring rules.

F. Archer heads the list of winning jockeys in England up to Nov. 9 with 220 wins out of 587 mounts. C. Wood coming next with 181 out of 577 and G. Ford, an Irish third with 78 out of 263.

The famous pacer Johnson has three full brothers, a chestnut two-year-old, a chestnut yearling and a bay weanling. His dam was this spring again bred to Enoch Goldsmith and is supposed to be in foal.
