### "ARSENIC PIES" WRECK KILLS 40 PILGRIMS FATAL FOR THREE

New York Baker Arrested On Charge of Homicide. HUNDRED WERE AFFECTED. Found Nearly All Had Eaten of Berry Pies.

NEW YORK, August 1.—Charles Abrahamson, a baker, who has been discharged from Shelburne's Restaurant at Broadway and 26th street, was arrested on a homicide charge today, following an investigation of the poisoning of more than one hundred persons—three of whom are dead—who ate in the restaurant yesterday.

### "Brutal Note" of Britain, Throwing Blame On the U.S., Scored By London Journals

Fear That Attempt To Fasten Blame For European Chaos On Washington Is Wrong. LONDON, August 1.—The British Government's reported decision to send a circular note to the allies and the United States in reference to the war debts has been discussed in political and financial circles for some days, with considerable misgivings in certain quarters. It is said there has been a strong division of opinion in the Cabinet over the question and a session of the press today sharply criticized the supposed Government decision.
