W. J. PHILLIPS OF SARNIA DIES AS RESULT OF ACCIDENT

William J. Phillips, 19, whose parents reside at 330 South Brock, Sarnia, died in St. Luke's Hospital, Chicago, of injuries sustained in a railway accident in that city. Few details as to how the accident happened are available.

Phillips, who was property man for the DeKayto shows, was riding in the property wagon, which was loaded with two other wagons on a flat car, when the accident happened. When crossing under a viaduct at the intersection of 15th and Indiana streets, Chicago, one of the girders supporting the viaduct, in some manner struck the top of the wagon in which Phillips was riding, smashing the top of the wagon and demolishing the interior. Phillips was struck by some of the wreckage and so badly injured that he died in the hospital. The body was brought to Sarnia for burial, and the funeral took place from the home of his mother, Mrs. C. Phillips on Sunday afternoon conducted by Rev. F.G. Newton to Lakeview cemetery, where the Woodmen took charge. Prior to his going to the

United States, deceased was a member of the Jr. Bear Cats football team and six of his chums in the team acted as pallbearers, namely, Cap McClellan, Jack Garvin, Arthur Beauchamp, Joe Steel, Walter Burdette and Ross Canton.

At the time of his death he was property man for the DeKreko Bros. Carnival company of San Antonio Texas, who are at present wintering in Chicago where the accident happened which proved fatal to him. Besides his parents, the deceased leaves to mourn him, his sisters, Mrs. H. W. Vollis of Toronto and Miss Rubie at home. Many floral offerings were received testifying to the high esteem in which the young man was held.

The deceased was a nephew of Jack and Reginald McIntosh of Watford.

HARRY RAY

One of the kindest and most generous souls to be found in any community went to his long rest in Vancouver, B.C., on Thursday, October 4th, in the person of Harry Ray. He was born in Watford fifty-one years ago, and was of the first generation born in this village. For some years he was employed by the late Peter Dodds and the customers of that busy store were glad of his cheery smile and his gracious manner. He went west some years ago and for a time was with Mr. George Rodgers, a former merchant of Watford. At one time Mr. Rodgers sent him up to the south shore of Lake Winnipeg to look after the Indian trade. The Indians learned to appreciate him, coming for many miles to deal with him. He later went to the coast and at the time of his death was in the clothing trade at Vancouver.

He was one of a generation of Watford boys nearly all of whom have left the old town to fill positions of responsibility and trust in other places. The village ought to be proud of them. Their names would furnish a long list. The only capital they started with was honesty of purpose and a desire to give efficient service

and no one better fulfilled the exacting requirements of this high standard in his dealings with his fellow men, than did Harry Ray.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Pethybridge of Watford, and one sister, Mrs. White, wife of the Bishop of Honan, China.
