**Gardening.** A correspondent of the N. Y. Gazette speaks of the great sums made by women in the vicinity of that city, who have turned their attention to market gardening. One lady hired two gardens and rented a small piece of land on Long Island; and though she was obliged to hire a helper work on, and her vegetables carried to market, she cleared, on the first year of her experiment, twelve hundred and fifty dollars over and over all expenses.
