

## Local and other matters.

The French cable is broken, two hundred miles from Brest.

Dom Pedro is on a visit to California.

From the 13th to the 18th ult., the Turks lost eighteen hundred killed, wounded and sick.

A school teacher in Portland N. B., was fined last week for too severe an application of the "birchen rod."

The driving snow storm, a week ago, extended over a large portion of this North American continent.

The keel for a 1000 ton ship is now laid in the yard of Abram Young, Esq. It is 175 feet in length.

On Friday the 28th inst., the first swallow of the season put in an appearance.

The Mexican "revolution" turns out to be a desperate attempt to prevent the execution of laws for the preservation of order on the frontiers.

All the London journals editorially support the position of the British Government in the Winslow extradition case.

A Donation Visit for the Rev. J. J. Teasdale, will be held at the residence of Mr. William Leonard, Paradise, on Thursday evening, the 4th of May.

The public crossings on the W. & A. R. in Wilmot, have undergone a thorough repair, and are in excellent condition.

It is reported that the dead body of Betts, the Cumberland murderer, has been found within his father's premises and Thompson Station.

If all who would like to be put in nomination for the next Presidency, were to leave the United States, it would materially lessen the population of the Republic.

His Royal Highness, Prince of Wales, and his younger brother, Prince Arthur, have been visiting Madrid. They were received, and treated with royal honors by King Alfonso.

A correspondent wants to know if the times have reached "hardpan" yet. We should think not, if we may judge from the way those who owe us, hold back from paying up.

Last week the Halifax Medical College closed its session of 1875-6. This institution has been in a sound and healthful condition. The degree of Doctor of Medicine was conferred on three of the students.

A jury in Carroll County, Georgia, lately brought in this verdict: "We, the jury, agree to disagree." The judge thereupon unanimously agreed for the attempt at wit to fine each juror five dollars.

The trial of George Reynolds for polygamy is in progress before Judge Emerson in the Third District Court at Salt Lake. This is the first indictment and trial under the law of 1862, and will probably be a test case.

A halibut, weighing 400 lbs. caught at Petite Passage, Digby County, was reported in St. John, N. B., last week. Some "fish stories" are reliable. We believe the above enormous halibut is no fiction, but a big reality.

Thirty-two thousand dollars are to be expended this summer in improving the Parliament grounds. We have a small garden spot attached to our domicile, that would be amazingly improved by the expenditure of half that amount.

A letter from Havana, addressed to a party in New York, says the insurgent Cubans ambushed five hundred Spanish soldiers near Naranjo, and killed and wounded all but fourteen, which little loss to themselves.

A Vienna despatch says the Porte has been diplomatically cautioned against arming the Mohammedan population in the insurgent Province, owing to the danger of a wholesale massacre of the Christians.

No Lieht.—Complaints are being made by those who have to pass through the bridge across the river, that the light placed there for their accommodation, has not been lit for a number of nights.

Sudden Death.—We regret to learn that a young girl, sixteen years of age, daughter of Mr. Bromley Sloomb, who lives at or near Middleton, dropped dead on Thursday morning, 27th inst. Supposed cause of death, disease of the heart.

The double turret ship "Indefatigable" was launched at Portsmouth, on 7th of April. The christening was performed by the Princess Louise. The "Times" says the "Indefatigable" is the most tremendous instrument of warfare yet created.

Mr. William Smith, Deputy Minister of Marine, has gone to England, charged by the Dominion Government, to represent Canadian views relative to Imperial legislation on shipping. The Hon. Edward Blake will also sail for Europe shortly.

The British Admiralty announces that the steamship *Pandora* will sail from Portsmouth May 25th, on her voyage round the world. The vessel will be a perilous, but fruitless conflict with cold weather and formidable ice-fields.

Affairs in southern Europe are in a very turbulent condition. Insurrectionary outbreaks in several portions of the Turkish Empire are ominous of war and dismemberment. Neighborly powers, each perhaps with its own *raison d'être*, are offering their services as pacificators; but the downfall of the Ottoman monarchy, at no distant day, seems inevitable. Such an event will cause a scramble among the potentates of surrounding nations for the possession of the fragments of a wrecked Empire.

## Telegraphic News.

(Special Dispatches to the Morning Chronicle.)

## EUROPE.

London, April 29.—The London *Chronicle* contains a proclamation of the title of Emperor of India.

In the House of Commons yesterday, Mr. Jenkins said that in view of his inability to obtain a place for his recent motion respecting the correspondence with America about the treaty of Washington, he now gave notice of his intention to withdraw the motion and move for the production of the papers.

A despatch from Brest, France, announces the loss of 21 lives by the foundering of the steamer *Orient*.

Over 3000 horses were destroyed by fire in Japanese towns on 26th ultimo.

The difficulty between the Portuguese at Macao and China has been revived, and a conflict now seems inevitable.

A correspondent telegraphs that insurgent leader Golub, operating near Gabor, has received eight cannon from Serbia.

A Standard despatch announces that Prussian Chamber passed a bill for incorporation of the Duchy of Luxemburg with the Kingdom of Prussia.

The Board of trade announces they have abandoned the intention of holding official inquiry in the loss of the steamer *Strathclyde*.

The *Times* Berlin telegram reports Austrian troops in Dalmatia increased to 30,000.

A despatch to Russian telegraphic agency says the Porte make it a point to insist that Nicosia is revitalized by force of arms.

The powers, however, still hope to prevent extension of war.

A later telegram to the same agency declares on authority that the assertion that Russia has proposed to the powers to demand autonomy of Bosnia and Herzegovina is untrue.

Russian adherents to the maintenance of the present status in Turkey and amelioration of Christian subjects of the Porte. She will not deviate therefrom except in accord with the five other great powers.

A telegram from the Secretary of Defence Association, in Barbadoes, reiterates all previous statements as to condition of affairs in that island. He declares intense anxiety still prevails and says that time will prove his message truthful.

## MONTREAL.

Montreal, April 30.—It is said that Mr. Henry Bihl, bookkeeper of this city, has been declared the heir-at-law of the famous Hot estate, which has been through the English court of chancery. The estate has been in litigation since 1709, and is valued at sixteen million pounds sterling.

S. S. Hadji sailed from Quebec yesterday for Pictou, and S. S. Beaver for Paspébe.

## UNITED STATES.

New York, April 29.—Belknap's impeachment trial was resumed in the United States Senate yesterday. Mr. Carpenter, on behalf of the accused, asking for a two weeks' postponement in order to prepare arguments on the question of jurisdiction. No decision on the application was reached, an adjournment being taken until Monday.

## CANADA.

Ottawa, April 29.—Major-General Selby Smith has forwarded to the War office a requisition for ten six-pounder guns for Quebec citadel. He has also ordered the construction of a saluting battery of six twenty-four pounders on Parliament Hill.

## EXAMINATION OF TEACHERS.

The Annual Examination as ordered by the Minister of Council of June 6th, 1872, will be held on Tuesday, the 10th of July next, at 3.30, a.m.

Deputy Examiners will be strictly forbidden to admit any person to be examined who fails to be present on the day named.

Candidates are required to forward to the Inspector, not later than June 1st, a written notice of their intention to be examined, and of the grade of license for which they will apply. No application can be received after this date. Candidates are to undergo examination in the grade for which they have applied to the Inspector. Seats will not be reserved for any who do not give notification as above.

Candidates already holding licenses of any grade from the Council of Public Instruction, are required to give the number of the same at the Examination.

All Candidates for License will be required to present themselves for examination, to furnish a written certificate of good moral character, signed by a minister of Religion, or by two Clergymen of the same denomination. These certificates are to be filed in the Educational Department, together with the other papers relating to the candidate's Examination.

## A MELANCHOLY DEATH.

From Saturday's St. John Globe.]

A very melancholy occurrence is reported to-day from Grand Bay, St. John River—the discovery of the dead body of a child on a floating piece of ice. It appears, from what we have been enabled to learn, that Mr. John Gregg, of Grand Bay, yesterday, noticed a piece of ice near the shore bearing what appeared to be the body of a child. A bridge of boards was made and the ice reached, when it was found that the worst fears had been realized, the body of a dead boy stretched on the ice, but was not frozen on it. The left hand was altogether gone, and there was a hole about three-quarters of an inch long, and extending into the bone, on the left side of the temple. There were no other marks on the body, however. How the wound came in the lad's head, and whether it was the cause of death, are for speculation, but it is believed the boy was frozen to death. He appeared to be nine or ten years old, and of short stature.

He was poorly clad the garments he wore being altogether unfit to protect him in cold weather. The only articles found in his pockets were a steel pen and a piece of gum. Intelligence of the sad discovery was sent to Corner Robinson yesterday, and he held an inquest immediately. The report generally believed is that the lad is son of Sim Whitney, of Indian-town, driver of Messrs. Waring Bros' team. Whitney's little boy, about 10 or 12 years

of age, ran away from home during the winter and has not been heard of for some time past. It is known that he went some distance up the Western Railway, but what became of him afterwards has not been traced. He may have wandered on the ice and perished of cold and hunger. An Indian town man who saw the body says it is not young Whitney's however. It is said to think that the remains will be interred without the identity of the boy being proved.

A most horrible murder was committed at St. Valerion de Milton (Quebec) on the morning of the 10th inst., by a woman named Guertin, a resident of that place. The mother, it appears, had placed the child in the bed wherein her sister-in-law lay sick. The child cried, and its mother came and nursed it. The sick girl in the meantime endeavored to get to sleep. She had partially succeeded, when she was aroused by the sounds of blows, and looking in the direction from whence they came, saw the inhuman mother holding the infant by its heels and thrashing his head against a large wooden trunk. The sick girl screamed for assistance, and the mother-in-law succeeded in snatching the child from its mother's grasp, but not before the poor infant was beyond human aid. The occurrence took place at 7 a.m., and the helpless infant lived till 1 o'clock. Insanity is the reason assigned for the mother's conduct, who had, from time to time, been suffering from mental derangement, and in which she had been known to attempt her own life with a razor, on one occasion nearly succeeding. Since then, however, she had appeared better, but of late days symptoms had returned. An inquest was held, and a verdict returned that the infant was murdered by its mother.
