History of Melvern Square. The pretty little village of Melvern Square, situated at the foot of the North Mountain, has a very interesting history. The place looks very different now from what it did when first first built, more than one hundred years ago. The men who have helped to build up this little village have made their mark also in the world.

The grand above referred to is known as the Gates and Fales grant and was issued by Governor Pate in 1757. The original grant is at present in the possession of Major Jacques, a resident of this place. The seal attached to this grant is 2 1/2 inches in diameter. The boundaries named by this grant were the Annapolis river on the south, the line on the north running along the face of the North Mountain, Kings county line on the east, and the Dodge road on the west.

There were other besides those mentioned in the grant who played an important part in the history of this village. Two others were the McNeills and the Wawalls, John McNeil, a native of Scotland, was the foreman in the building of Kings College at Windsor. He was the first to build a brick chimney in Melvern Square, obtaining the clay from a clayed quarry, the Baptist church was built by him.

The Wawalls came from New York. They were the first to introduce musical instruments, and performed on them. They also established the first Sabbath school. I will not mention the names of the other settlers, but time and space will not permit. At present there is a school of two departments. Education has not been neglected in this place. Wells Cudon, father of the late Honorable Cudon, inspector of schools for Hants county, was one of the first to teach in Melvern Square.
