INTRODUCTION.

In presenting this Manual of the Ojebway Language to the public, the writer shes it to be understood that he by no means assumes to himself the title of rammarian or Philologist; neither has he had the advantage of a very lengthened rm of acquaintance with the Ojebway people. He feels satisfied that there are hers who are far better qualified than himself to undertake the work, but, finding at no one else seems prepared to do so, and feeling the great need that there is for ch a Manual as an assistance to missionaries and others in acquiring the language, is resolved to do his best in the matter, and he assures his readers that however perfect his work may be, he believes they will not find anything in it calculated to isguide them, and his humble hope is that they will find much that will be of real rvice to them. It is written in a homely style, and is intended, as has been said, mply as an assistance to those who are labouring in God's vineyard for the good of is Indians.

Some thirty years since, both a Dictionary and a Grammar were published by a rench Priest (afterwards Bishop) in the French Orthography, but these valuable orks are now unfortunately out of print. With considerable difficulty a copy of the ictionary was procured, and proved of great service in the compilation of this work.
