SUGGESTED INVESTIGATION OF INCREASED LUMBER PRICES

Mr. P. M. Mahoney (Calgary South): Mr. Speaker, I have a question for the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs. In view of the steadily worsening situation in respect of lumber prices and supply, which has seen all prices increase drastically and some prices more than double between February 1968 and February 1969, which is having a disastrous inflationary effect on housing costs particularly, and the stability of the construction industry generally, will the minister consider recommending that the Combines Investigation Branch investigate the lumber industry?

THE PAS, MAN.-ADMINISTRATION OF HEALTH SERVICES
