Generally speaking, we find that these reports are exaggerated. I am sure the hon. gentleman would want the government to bring in the revenue to which it is entitled on time.

ALLEGED DISCRIMINATORY TREATMENT RECEIVED BY QUEBEC POTATO GROWERS

As the result of various pressures made by government members, the Department of Agriculture has decided to grant what it had already granted to New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island producers. We will announce this afternoon a policy for eastern Canada, that is the same formula available to Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick.

OIL—GOVERNMENT ACTION RELATED TO INTERNATIONAL PRICING ARRANGEMENTS

Hon. Robert L. Stanfield (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, my question regarding the Paris Conference which did not exactly work out is directed to the Acting Prime Minister or the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources. Now that Canada is becoming a very substantial net importer of oil does the Government of Canada intend to take any initiative concerning international arrangements related to the price of oil? I know the Acting Prime Minister said the opinion he expressed in the House would reverberate around the world, but I wonder beyond that whether the Government of Canada is doing anything more here that it is in respect of South Vietnam?

Hon. Donald S. Macdonald (Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources): Mr. Speaker, if I might answer, the standing committee has of course completed its study of the international energy program agreement and we will be proceeding in the very near future to indicate our participation in the International Energy Agency. I think I would have to concede to the analysis of the Leader of the Opposition about the breakdown in the Paris discussions. One of the initiatives we will be taking will be within the International Energy Agency to see if that particular discussion can be reopened and, as a substantial exporter of a number of primary commodities, to see what agreement there would be on expanding the discussions so that they could find some agreement among the developing countries and other primary exporters.
