FEDNOR

SHABBAT ZACHOR

Mr. Svend J. Robinson (Burnaby—Kingsway): Mr. Speaker, this year's commemoration of Shabbat Zachor, the sabbath of remembrance and prayer for the Jewish community of Syria, will be held on March 14 in synagogues across Canada.

On that day, not only Jews but all Canadians are reminded of the oppressive treatment of 4,300 Syrian Jews, including surveillance by Syrian secret police, economic restrictions and denial of basic human rights such as the right to vote, freedom of assembly, freedom from arbitrated tension and the right to emigrate, in contravention of the UN Declaration of Human Rights.

The plight of two brothers, Selim and Eli Swed, serving six and a half year sentences after unfair trials, is particularly grave. Recently members of this House and the Senate from all parties joined to form the Canadian Parliamentary Friendship Group for Syrian Jewry.

As vice-chair of this group, I join with my colleagues in commemorating Shabbat Zachor, and in strongly urging the Syrian government to release the Swed brothers and ensure that at last there is full respect for the fundamental human rights of all Syrian Jews, including the right to emigrate.
