Student unemployment in Nova Scotia stood last year at 24 per cent. Tuition fees in Nova Scotia universities have gone up 50 per cent since 1985. In the same time period SEED job funding is down 44 per cent. Student loans are slashed. No jobs, no loans, equals no education.
