Immigration to Canada.

As regards the first of these statements, it may be remarked that the numbers of immigrants passing through Canada for the United States were simply passengers whose destination, before leaving home, was the United States. There is, as appears from the figures a tendency to decline in the numbers of these passengers; while on the other hand there is very large and steady increase in the numbers of the settlers in the Dominion. The numbers of these in 1878 being about five times those in 1866.

The nationalities of the immigrants who came to Canada can only be taken in the case of those who arrive by sea at the port of Quebec. The nationalities cannot be taken at the Inland Ports. The following statement shows a comparison for three years:

The bulk of all the immigrants by the St. Lawrence route in 1873 came by steam-ships, as appears by the following state-ment:—

The same fact has been spparent for a number of years past. Ewigrants from the United Kingdom and the European conti-United Kingdom and the European conti-nent show a most decided preference for steamships over sal ing vessels. Steam-ships bring them in much shorter time, and in much healthler condition. The ordinary fare by steamships, with the exception of the assistance afforded to immigrants in the assistance shorded to immigrants in certain cases by Passenger Warrains, is much higher than that by sailing vessels. But in the case of a mechanic or laboring man earning wages, the saving of his time is of much more value than the difference of the form to say with profile superior community. the fare, to say nothing of the superior com-fort and better means provided by the steamships, together with greater immunity from

A feature on the returns of 1873 to which the Minister of Agriculture draws attention in his report is that they coutain a number of 8,971 persons who immigrated to Uanada from the United States. These figures are obtained from entries at the Custom Houses, and may be accepted as another proot of the depression which has prevailed in the United States since the fall of 1872. The effect of this depression has been to check emigration as a whole from the continent of Europe to America during 1874. The following statement of sallings from the Port of Liverpool of emigrants for all parts during the emigrating months of 1873 and 1874, taken from figures published by the Imperial Authorities, may be accepted as a harometer of the emigration movement, as the sailings from all other ports in
