

## BOYS FROM CANADA FULFIL ALL HOPES

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Gave Patriotic Address to Ontario Women Liberals.

### NOT POLITICAL SPEECH

Attention Centres on the War and Dominion Must Be United.

Members of the Ontario Women's Liberal Association and others, anxious to hear Sir Wilfrid Laurier, packed the hall of the Y.W.C.A. on McGill street yesterday afternoon, undeterred by the ferocious aspect of the weather, and were rewarded by hearing one of the most patriotic addresses that have been delivered in Toronto since the outbreak of the war. "We are not Liberals nor Conservatives, but loyal Canadians," said the leader of the opposition in the course of his address, and this was the key to the proceedings of the afternoon. The hall had quite a festive appearance in its adornment of draped flags, and the platform handsomely outlined in great pots of plants of ferns, palms and hydrangeas. Mrs. W. W. Rowell presided, and Sir Wilfrid on his entrance was accompanied by N. W. Rowell, K.C., George Graham and Geo. Gibson, president of the Young Men's Liberal Club. Preceding the address of the afternoon business left over from the morning session was concluded, when reports of the patriotic work of their various branches were read by Mrs. Edgar Hamilton, Mrs. Power, Stratford; Mrs. Preston, Brantford; and Mrs. Miller of Windsor.

The fine work of the Liberal women of Toronto in connection with the hospital at Exhibition camp was told by the president, Mrs. Ballantyne. Received Ovation. Sir Wilfrid, who was introduced in a few graceful words by Mrs. Rowell, received an ovation on rising to address the gathering. Ontario, he said, had always been a land of welcome to the patriot work of their various branches were read by Mrs. Edgar Hamilton, Mrs. Power, Stratford; Mrs. Preston, Brantford; and Mrs. Miller of Windsor.

"In ordinary times," continued Sir Wilfrid, "I should probably speak of the Liberal party, but these are not ordinary times, and it is not politics, nor economic conditions about which we are thinking—our attention is on this war. Unless I mistake the feelings of Toronto, that which is engrossing its attention is the war and its horrible problems. But the war has had one good result, it has made us realize that British institutions are the best produced by men of the present day."

British Ideals Always. The brought up in Quebec, Sir Wilfrid said he had always inclined to British ideals. France brought changes about by means of revolution. England by reform, and this would be the means adopted if changes were inaugurated at the close of the war.

Speaking of Germany, Sir Wilfrid stated his belief that its government must now see that an empire cannot rest on force, but on freedom in every part of its territory. At the outset of hostilities Germany had imagined that the British Empire would be disintegrated. She imagined that Ireland would be in the throes of a civil war, and that Canada, Australia and even India would break loose. What must have been its disillusionment! John Redmond declared that the Catholics of the south and the Protestants of the north would take care of Ireland; from Canada we had expected much, but the boys had done even greater than had been anticipated, and in South Africa it is the Boer led by General Botha, who is defending the British flag.

The one Saxon word "freedom" had brought this about. Allegiance, depending on force alone, would never bring about such a spectacle. We must give of our treasure and our blood to maintain the British flag. The blessing and lesson of the war, he said, was that it had shown the British Empire the power of the British Empire, and the crushing of Germany.

Sir Wilfrid concluded by complimenting the women from whom he had received a good deal of zest, and whom he would remember for a long time.

A vote of thanks was tendered by Mrs. Egan of Hamilton, and seconded by Mrs. Ballantyne. Greetings from the Young Men's Liberal Club were given by Mr. Gibson of London. George Graham also made a short address.

## GERMANS IN DANGER OF ENVELOPMENT

Russian Army in Galicia in Position to Manoeuvre as Pleases.

### STRIKE Foe IN FLANK

Enormous Phalanx of Germans Thrown Across San River.

Special to The Toronto World. PETROGRAD, May 20.—It is calculated that the enemy has lost 150,000 men since his advance began from the Donajec. General Dmtrieff's army during its successful retreat counted for 70,000. The entire Russian army in Galicia is now in a position to manoeuvre as it pleases. The extreme section of the Opatow has moved westward into south Poland and threatens to envelop the Germans. An enormous phalanx of Germans has been brought across the Gorlice-Jaslo railway track which was destroyed. They covered only four miles a day. Then the Russians compelled them to diverge north of Jaroslau, where positions were sunk under a bridge and a way was made across the San. The Germans passed over in face of a terrific artillery fire and lost enormous numbers of men. The Russians hold both banks of the San south of Jaroslau.

### BENCH WARRANT USED TO RETAIN WITNESS

R. C. Nelles, 22 College street, who failed to appear in the non-jury court yesterday altho he had been served with a subpoena in the forenoon, was placed in charge of the sheriff at the city hall on the strength of a bench warrant that was issued by Mr. Justice Middleton, for twenty minutes. This was the first time in four years that a bench warrant had been issued in the civil assize court. Nelles was needed as a witness in an action brought by Solomon Naiman, Aron Rothman, Louis Bernstein and Thomas H. Wilson, against C. F. Wright, real estate broker, and Mrs. Mabel Wright.
