THE GERMAN REPORT TAKING THE FRENCH BY SURPRISE AT BAGATELLE, WHICH THEY CAPTURED AFTER A SHARP FIGHT, AND RETAINED THE POSITION AGAINST COUNTER-ATTACKS. THIS IS PROBABLY THE RIDGE SOUTH OF THE SOUVAUR RAVINE THAT THE FRENCH RETOOK TODAY
