Officers Continue Aggressive Campaign for Recruits-Offices Established.

At last night's parade the 109th Regiment had 666 members, recruits and cadets, in line. After drill at Bayside Park the battailon marched back to the Pearl street armories by way of Yonge, Richmond, Victoria, Wilton, Yonge, Queen and York streets. Dr. Forbes Godfrey, M.L.A., addressed the regiment at the armories on "Recruiting."

"The time has come when every man in Canada must join either the 109th Regiment; or some other regiment, or wear safety-first button," said Dr. Godfrey. He told stories illustrating the preparedness of Germany at the beginning of the war, and intimated that every Canadian must find his niche and get into it, or lose his self-respect."

The 109th Regiment is opening up a recruiting office near the corner of St. Clair avenue and Dufferin street. They have a tent on University avenue, near the armories, and are opening up another on the Vaughan road. This is but the start of an aggressive recruiting campaign by the 109th in charge of Cast. Boehm and Lieuts. Davies and Livett. In the last three days 9c recruits have been secured for overseas. Thirty-one of these were passed by the depot at the armories, 24 were rejected and 41 have not been reported on.

WITNESSES SWEAR **CAR WENT SLOWLY**

Inquest in Case of Little Girl Killed at Willow-

The coroner's investigation of the death of Bessie McKittrick, the seven-year-old girl who was struck by an automobile opposite the Willowdale post-office on Monday evening, was opened yesterday morning before Coroner Dr. Bond of North Toronto, in the school house at that place. Considerable delay was caused at the opening of the inquest by the absence of Charles Tillson Harper of Penetang, the driver of the autowhich struck the girl. He was detained at No. 5 police station during the night, and on this account the hearing did not proceed until 2 o'clock.

The accused had in the meantime been brought before Magistrate W. H. Clay in the county court on the charge of manslaughter, which was later adjourned until Tuesday next. Harper was unable to secure bail and will be held until bondsmen are forthcoming.

When the jury reassembled at 2 o'clock eight witnesses were examined, including the young men who were accompanying Harper, the party being on

When the jury reassembled at 2 o'clock eight witnesses were examined including the young men who were accompanying Harper, the party being on their way to Penetang when the accident occurred.

Andrew McClure, uncle of the dead girl, testified that the two children, accompanied by two women. had been visiting at his home in Willowdale. The party, accompanied by Mr. McClure, boarded a southbound car with the intention of going to the city. After boarding the first car it was found to be tocrowded and they disembarked, the little girl, instead of following the rest, walking directly in front of the auto. He further stated that the car was to his knowledge not going at a higher rate than four miles an hour, and that every effort was made to stop it, the machine being brought to a standstill in a little more than its own length:

Other witnesses testified that the driver on noticing the little girl turned sharply into the ditch, and following the accident did everything in his power to render assistance. In reply to repeated questions by the crown as to the sobriety of the driver the witnesses all swore that there was no sign of liquor.

Coroner Dr. Bond, after hearing all the evidence available, adjourned the inquest until Friday evening at 8 o'clock in the same place.

LARGER SURPLUS LESSENED MARKET

Resolution Passed Cheers by British Trades Congress.

PROPOSED BY SEDDON

Nationalization of Railroads is Strongly Urged on Gov-

BRISTOL, Eng., Sept. 7 .- A resoluon against conscription was passed nanimously, with great cheering, at today's session of the Trades Union Congress. The resolution was forwarded to Premier Asquith, Earl Kitchener, David Lloyd George and Lord Northcliffe.
The congress also declared in favor

of nationalization of the railroads taking the position that the experience of the government in managing the roads during the war was sufficiently encouraging to justify this step. Scored Northcliffe Press.

James A, Seddon himself moved the resolution against conscription. It expressed "hearty appreciation of magnificent response to the call for volunteers to fight against the tyranny of militarism," and protests against "the sinister efforts of a section of the reactionary press in formulating newspaper policies for party purposes and attempting to foist on their East country conscription, which always Geo. proves a burden to workers." The resolution promises assistance to the government in every way to procure sufficient number of volunteers.

For the field artiller, another 27 men (single) are wanted. Fifteen men are also wanted for the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery by Sergt. Major Pepiat.
