

### MANY WOMEN JOIN HOME GUARD CORPS

Recruiting Rally at Dundurn Heights Secures Good Results.

#### NUMBER FOR KILTIES

New Association to Perform Useful Service for the Country.

Many recruits were secured for the different regiments of the Canadian Women's Home Guards at a recruiting meeting held last night at Dundurn Heights, St. Clair avenue, W. J. MacFarlane occupying the chair.

Prof. J. Cusin of the Meisterschaft School of Languages, in a brief address, said the Women's Home Guard was in a certain sense, not a new idea, but merely a continuation of a great many female organizations promoted for the welfare of humanity.

He believed that the association would be a means of stimulating among men for overseas service and maintained that as the young men who are going to the front are the ones who are most needed in the home.

Extreme care is taken in selecting recruits for the Kiltie regiment, only women over five feet five inches being taken in choosing Kilties.

When spoken to with regard to the meeting, held at the house of Miss Laura McCully, last evening, in connection with more drill grounds for the guards, Miss McCully declined to express any opinion whatever.

In an interview with The World Colonel Gallaway expressed surprise at the report in the evening papers in this connection. When asked whether Miss McCully needed any permission to hold a meeting of this kind, Colonel Gallaway stated that she should have consulted the executive committee.

WITNESSES SWEAR CAR WENT SLOWLY

Inquest in Case of Little Girl Killed at Willowdale.

The coroner's investigation of the death of Bessie McClure, aged 10, who was struck by an automobile opposite the Willowdale post-office on Monday evening, was completed yesterday morning before Coroner Dr. Bond of North Toronto, in the school house at that place.

When the jury reassembled at 2 o'clock, eight witnesses were examined, including the young men who were accompanying Heron, and the driver of the car which was Penning when the accident occurred.

Other witnesses testified that the driver on noticing the little girl turned sharply into the street, but that every effort was made to stop it, the machine being brought to a standstill in a little more than its own length.

Coroner Dr. Bond, after hearing all the evidence available, adjourned the inquest until Friday evening at 8 o'clock in the same place.

LARGER SURPLUS LESSENER MARKET

R. W. McKinnon of the firm of Thompson & McKinnon, members of the Chicago Board of Trade and vice-presidents of J. P. Bickell & Co., of this city, passed through Toronto yesterday.

Mr. McKinnon is a bear on wheat and thinks the American farmer will be slaughtered if he holds his crop instead of selling at an early date.

Mr. McKinnon says his committee claims a total crop on the North American continent of 1,300,000,000 bushels and admitting a consumption per capita and for seed of six bushels, this which has to find a market. This is 200,000,000 bushels more than was expected last year, when the European market was larger than at present.

#### LABOR OPPOSED TO CONSCRIPTION

Resolution Passed Amid Cheers by British Trades Congress.

PROPOSED BY SEDDON

Nationalization of Railroads is Strongly Urged on Government.

BRISTOL, Eng., Sept. 7.—A resolution against conscription was passed unanimously, with great cheering, at today's session of the Trades Union Congress.

The resolution was forwarded to Premier Asquith, Earl Kitchener, David Lloyd George and Lord Northcliffe.

The congress also declared in favor of nationalization of the railroads, and the government in managing the roads during the war was sufficiently encouraging to justify this step.

Scored Northcliffe Press.

James A. Seddon himself moved the resolution against conscription. It expressed hearty appreciation of the magnificent response to the call for volunteers to fight against the tyranny of militarism, and protests against the sinister aspects of the war.

The resolution promises assistance to the government in every way to procure a sufficient number of volunteers.

Mr. Seddon twitted Lord Northcliffe for his newspaper campaigns on the subject of conscription.

Lloyd George's Appeal.

The congress received this afternoon a telegram from the minister of munitions, David Lloyd George, commenting on the speech made yesterday by President Seddon, in which he emphasized the desire of the workers to assist the government and hoped the government would do its share in the matter of limiting employment profits.

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### OUT OF TOWN MEN JOIN COLORS HERE

One Hundred and Twenty-Nine Recruits Accepted at Central Depot.

#### STILL MORE WANTED

Ninth Battery Must Secure Men for Garrison Duty at Quebec.

One hundred and twenty-nine recruits for overseas service were passed and attested by the central recruiting depot at the Armories yesterday.

The following official statement was issued from general headquarters today:

In the Tolmino sector during the night of Sept. 6, the enemy, after violent artillery and rifle fire, attacked our positions on Montenero.

Altogether the attack was completely repulsed with heavy losses.

On the lower Isonzo the enemy bombarded San Pietro, Sasso Liano, and Montalco.

Several of the inhabitants were killed. We removed two floating mines from the river.

In the upper Camonica valley our artillery opened fire on the enemy in Presena basin. In Val Cecina (valley of the river) on the night of Sept. 5 one of our detachments, who attacked him at Luzzano, north of Besenico.

MEMBER OF EGYPTIAN CABINET WAS STABBED

Fathy Pasha, Struck From Behind, Not Badly Hurt.

CAIRO, Egypt, Sept. 7, via London, 7:05 p.m.—Fathy Pasha, minister of pious foundations in the Egyptian Government, was stabbed three times by a knife by an employe of the ministry of finance, who attacked him from behind while he was conversing with friends in the Cairo Railroad station.

Fathy Pasha fired with a revolver at his assailant, but missed him. The wounds of the minister are not serious.

STRUCK DOWN BY AUTO NURSE BADLY INJURED

Hattie Littlejohn Stepped From Sidewalk in Front of Motor Car.

Mattie Littlejohn, a nurse of the Parkdale Hospital staff, was struck down and badly injured about ten o'clock last night at the corner of Queen street and Gwynne avenue, by a motor car driven by Ernest Hart, Harry Barron of 250 Crawford street, owner of the car, who was the only driver.

It is stated that Miss Littlejohn stepped from the curb just as the motor car came along the corner, and the accident was apparently unavoidable.

At the hospital early this morning it was reported that the condition of Miss Littlejohn, who is about 32 years of age, is critical. Five of her ribs are broken and serious internal injuries are feared.

ENGLISH LUTHERANS NAME NEW OFFICERS

Rev. H. J. Behrens, Berlin, Elected President of Western Conference at Galt.

GALT, Ont., Sept. 7.—The western conference of the English Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Central Canada was held here today in St. Paul's Lutheran Church with morning, afternoon and evening sessions. This morning Rev. W. H. Knapp of Humboldt preached the conference sermon and administered Holy Communion.

In the afternoon it was announced that the following official communication concerning the fighting in "Caucasus":

In the region of Olti, near Tewa, the Turks have fired without result on the Russian positions.

In the Van region our reconnoitering expedition has been successful.

"Our scouts have been in collision with the Turks near the villages of Aichtis and Kouplika."

ADVANCE OF GERMANS CHECKED BY FLOODS

Russian Rivers Overflow Banks, Putting End to Offensive of Enemy.

COPENHAGEN, via London, Sept. 8, 2:40 a.m.—A despatch to The Politikon from Berlin (base):

The autumn floods already have started all along the eastern front. The rivers everywhere are overflowing, and the German advance has been checked.

NORWEGIAN BARQUE SUNK

LONDON, Sept. 7, 8:20 p.m.—It is announced that the Norwegian barque Store sand, which sailed from Iquique, Chile, April 1, for Liverpool, has been sunk.

Her crew was saved.

The Store sand was a vessel of 1639 tons. She was built in 1893 and owned in Christiania.

LIVERPOOL, Sept. 8, 3:23 a.m.—"No submarine was seen by anyone before the ship was struck nor was any warning given," says an official statement issued by the Allan Line regarding the steamer Hesperian and which seemingly sets at rest the story that a warning was shouted by a lookout on the night of the accident.

The impact of the torpedo was so great, the statement adds, that the vessel stopped as dead as were the engines.
