**RESTRICTING HOTELMEN**

Condition Demands Drastic Legislation by License Board.

HAMILTON, Thursday, Sept. 30.—At a congregational meeting held last evening at Victoria Avenue Baptist Church, the resignation of Rev. Dr. A. H. Cline was accepted. Dr. Cline has occupied the pulpit at Victoria Avenue Baptist Church for the year, and has leaves shortly to accept a call to the Georgetown Baptist Church.

Back From Syracuse.

Alex. McKay of Cayuga was brought back from Syracuse yesterday by Detective Sawyer and delivered to answer to a charge of fraud against him by the McKay Realty Company. Can't Find Barker Will.

Samuel Barker has been made during the past two weeks, it has not been found, and action has now been taken to wind up the affairs of the late Barker. Several hundred thousand dollars, following the disposition of the estate, will be made to the proper heirs through the courts.

The kitchen will cost \$150, which has already been raised.

Await Decision of Board.

The military officials here expect momentarily a decision with regard to the location of the batteries. The belief is that hotelkeepers and shop license holders are going to object to the location. The officers believe that the action of the hotelmen in placing the batteries on a par with "Indian" hotels, which was designed to show that their intentions were not good, is a step in proving conclusively to the license board that conditions are such that they would be a drastic remedy. It would surprise some of the military authorities if the board were to give their consent as six o'clock in the evening.

Offers to Purchase School.

The Rev. Canon Daw announced yesterday that if the board of education will place Old Charlton Avenue School on the market, his church is ready to purchase it. The intention is to extend St. John the Evangelist Church, and if the school property can be secured a handsome extension will be made. The congregation has grown steadily for some time, and additional room has been needed for some time.
