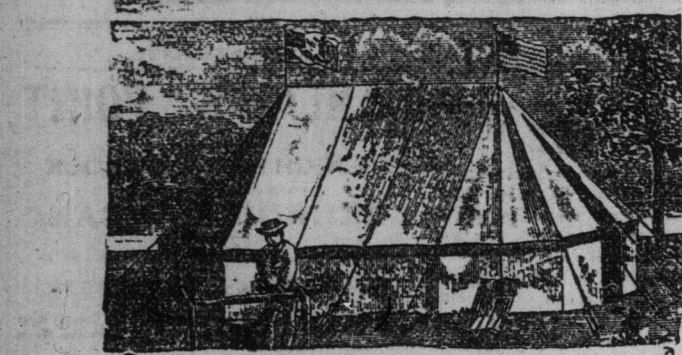

POINTERS TO THE YANKEES.

A Spanish Statesman says That If War Comes Spain Will Find a Fight in Cuba.

Madrid, July 6.—The Marquis Vega Armijo, ex-President of Congress and ex-Minister of Foreign Affairs, speaking at a public meeting in Saragossa, said: "If called to power our program will comprise the necessity of stopping the

humiliating policy which allows Yankees to trample on Spanish rights, and even revise the precedents of Spanish judges. We shall entrust our navy to search within Spanish waters filibustering vessels which, under the American flag, bring help to the insurgents. Our attitude toward the United States will be courteous. I am sure energy will not bring a rupture, but if war comes the Yankees will find whom to fight within the fields of Cuba.

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PROVED BY THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT.

PROSPERITY NOT YET IN SIGHT.

The official returns of business failures in the United States seem to establish the fact that the long-anticipated prosperity has not yet made its appearance.

These failures for the second quarter of the current year involved liabilities to an aggregate of \$43,684,876, a larger amount than that of the corresponding period in any other previous year since 1883, with the exception of 1890. It is claimed, however, that the worst disasters of the quarter and of the half year were due to the effects of the depression and losses of previous years, from which many had not had time to recover.

Bradstreet's thus summarizes the situation during the first half of the year: "The record of business failures throughout the United States during the past six months is not as favorable as was anticipated at the close of the first quarter of the current calendar year, particularly with reference to the aggregate liabilities, which have been unexpectedly increased by the embarrassment of several large manufacturing and other concerns in New England."
