Storekeeper McAndrew has prepared figures showing how well the city streets are watered. Here are some of the facts furnished by him: It requires 859 carts of water to sprinkle the streets each day, exclusive of the amount used in the electric sprinklers. Each cart contains about 475 gallons of water, making a total of about 408,025 gallons used daily, and about makes the total amount of water used 51,003,125 gallons yearly.
