Chicago, June 11.—The M. Lewis Clark Stakes, for which 11 American Derby candidates were entered as possible starters, drew a crowd of 15,000 spectators to the Harlem track to-day.

Moharib, at 18 to 5, and ridden by Aubnichon, won the race by a neck. Bill Curtis, at 40 to 1, was second, a head in front of Flo Rob, the latter coupled with Flower King as the Tichenor entry. English Lad, poorly handled, finished fifth.

He was off inst to a poor start, was cut off, knocked about, and, aitho he rushed up into a contending position in the stretch, was again hopelessly cut off on the rail and finally fell back beaten.
