Toronto, Ont., March 5.—The G. T. R. express for Montreal, leaving here It 9 o'clock this morning, crashed into a stalled freight at York and a dozen passengers were injured, while a score had miraculous escapes from The engines were completely wrecked by the force of the impact. There is no explanation as to why the engineer of the express ran into the freight. The train was 40 minutes late and was traveling about 30 miles
