Western Liberals' War Program

WINNIPEG, Aug. 8.—The war measures resolution read by Neely, and passed by the Western Liberal Convencion is as follows: "In the war for the defence of democracy against military despotism conditions call for the putting forth by each allied belligerent of its full power as the only assurance of victory; in times of peril the only ref the country, moral and material, man-power and wealth, are justly disposable by the state for the preservation of its national liberty. The imperative duty of the people of Canada today in regard to the war is its continued and vigorous prosecution.

(1).-By conferring with the British Government for the purpose of definitely ascertaining the scope and character of all the service that rendered by Canada in the conduct of the war. (2).-By the maintenance, in unimpaired strength at the front, of our fighting forces, and the taking of all steps necessary to secure required reinforcements for this purpose.

(3).—By organizing the productions of our other contributions to war, such as food, munitions and other necessities, upon lines of the greatest efficiency. (4).-By the complete extirction of profiteering in all business having to do with munitions and the necessaries of life, if necessary by the nationalization of these industries, or by the adaptation of the British

system of controlled establishments. (5).—By the recovery for the public treasury of undue profits obtained since the beginning of the war by the exploitation of the interests of the people for the present requirements of the state.

(6).—By the application of a combined system of sharply-graduated mes and excess profits which shall insure that every

citizen shall bear his or her full share of the war burden, according to

his or her means. (7).—By thoroughly organizing the nation and carrying out this program by whatever means may be necessary for its accomplishment.

WINNIPEG, Aug. 8.—By sitting until 6 o'clock this afternoon the dele gates to the Liberal convention disposed of a large number of resolutions and cleared the way for an evening sitting devoted to discussion of war measures The resolutions committee spent the greater part of the day in the formulation of a war policy, which secured unanimous support when presented to-

The convention went on record as approving an increase of the British preference to 50 per cent of the general tariff, "with a view to ultimate free trade with Great Britain," the latter phrase being added in the convention as an amendment. Approve of National Bank.

The resolution on banking approved the creation of a national bank, and the formation of a commission with wide powers to control the banking system of the country. A strong resolution, branding the Borden Administration as incompetent and unworthy of public confidence, was passed earlier in the day.

The convention adopted a resolution declaring that the Federal Government should, as an emergency war measure, for the immediate conservation and production of foodstuffs: Prohibit the manufacture of all high-grade white flour in Canada, and establish a maximum grade that will add materially to the bread produced in Canada this year."

Develop Steel Industry.

Growers say that it is hardly worth while to produce either beets or carrots with the values of these vegetables as low as they are at present.
