

Willing To Modify Blockade of Enemy Coasts.

Buenos Aires, Aug. 28.—Germany's reply to Argentina's note embodying the demands in connection with the submarine campaign as affecting Argentine shipping, has been received.

In official circles it was stated that the reply was satisfactory. According to the newspaper La Razon, the German note meets all the demands of Argentina. The note says that Germany, 'in order to maintain friendly relations with Argentina, is willing to modify her blockade of enemy coasts, allowing freedom of the seas to vessels under the Argentine flag carrying food."


