## NO CREDENTIALS FOR DELEGATES SENT BY ACTIVE SERVICE MEN

President of G. W. V. A. Says It Is Beyond His Power.

The two delegates elected to attend the Great War Veterans' Association convention at a meeting of the "active service" men held Saturday night in the Richmond Hotel will not be given credentials by Lieut.-Col. W. G. Coles, president of the Great War Veterans' Association of No. 1 Military District. The fact that the delegates were elected by the local branch of the Great War Veterans' Association would be given credentials to these two men," said Col. Coles.

In connection with the stand taken by Sergt. Creswell, who organized the "active service" men, officers of the local branch of the G. W. V. A. are pointing to the resolutions submitted at the recent provincial convention at Hamilton. The resolution, which was passed there and sent on to the local branch, was to the effect that the members of the Great War Veterans' Association would be given credentials to these two men," said Col. Coles.

Resolved, that all members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, British Expeditionary Force and the forces of our allies who have served in any war in which Great Britain or her allies have been engaged, and who hold an honorable discharge and who have been entitled to active membership in the Great War Veterans' Association, should be entitled to the same. An amendment was moved to the resolution to the effect that the word "active" be deleted, and the resolution was amended to read: "Resolved, that all members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, British Expeditionary Force and the forces of our allies who have served in any war in which Great Britain or her allies have been engaged, and who hold an honorable discharge and who have been entitled to active membership in the Great War Veterans' Association, should be entitled to the same."

The fact that Sergt. Creswell seconded the resolution to give associates full rights in the G. W. V. A. is recalled, with some emphasis by the members who are opposing the new organization launched on Saturday night.

## DID NOT SHOOT SELF TO AVOID SERVICE, W. O. R. MAN CLAIMS

Pte. Reist Pleads Not Guilty Before Court-Martial.

Pte. Eudore R. Reist of Kitchener and Pte. Wilfred Trudell of Windsor, both members of the 1st Battalion, Western Ontario Regiment, appeared before a district court-martial at Carling Heights Tuesday afternoon, charged with injuring themselves wilfully in order to escape military service.

Reist was also charged with falling to report for duty on April 24, when ordered to do so by the deputy registrar. He stated that he was unable to do so, as he shot himself in the foot that morning, and therefore pleaded guilty to the charge, but stated that he was not guilty of wilfully shooting himself.

Eleanor Reist, a sister of the accused, stated that her brother went out to the barn early in the morning of the shooting, and the first knowledge she had of the accident was when he called her, and asked for a doctor to be summoned. Although the barn is not shot, as the cream separator was making too much noise.

After her brother had been received into hospital, she went to the postoffice, and signed for a registered letter ordering him to report for duty. She, assisted by her mother and neighbors, worked the farm after her brother was injured.

Dr. Honsberger stated that he was summoned to the Reist home on April 24, and found the prisoner seriously wounded in the foot. He ordered him removed to hospital, where he was treated. He stated that the prisoner told him he was shooting sparrows when he accidentally shot himself.

The prisoner said the doctor told him the man was not incapacitated for military service by the loss of a toe. "You ladies now often have a toe amputated because of corns," he said.

His shoes fit because of corns, or to make his shoes fit them?" asked Major G. Weekes, judge advocate of the court. "Well, the shoes caused the corns," replied Dr. Honsberger, amidst laughter.

P. Koerber, a neighbor of the accused, stated that he had loaned Reist a shotgun to shoot sparrows. He had owned it for 30 years, and had never given it before unless the trigger had first been pulled.

Lieut. Aiken of the Canadian Garrison Regiment stated that he, in company with other officers, had visited the scene of the accident, but could find no bullet marks in the barn.

The prisoner, for personal reasons, refused to take an oath on the Bible when asked to make a statement. He stated that his mother had purchased a farm in December last, and he was working on it at the time, having received exemption. He later worked on the farm and applied for exemptions, but received no word in reply until he came to London in April, but received no promise of exemption.

On April 23 he learned that there was a registered letter at the postoffice in Bridgeport for him, and came to that place and borrowed the shotgun. He had a new horse, which was not yet broken, and he was unable to feed the horses and, seeing several sparrows outside, seized the shotgun and fired.

In order to avoid injuring the horses in the stable, the prisoner swung the gun, and it exploded, injuring his foot. He stated that he was willing to serve in the army. Reist, in his statement, said that he had intended to come to London to see about his military status.

Later a court of inquiry was held at his house by three officers, and he asked them if they would notify him when they reported. They told him that they would not hear from them, but from someone else, and the accused stated that he was waiting to be notified to report, when arrested at his farm by the Dominion police, while still under military attendance for his injury.

Major McKittrick of the Western Ontario Regiment prosecuted, and asked the prisoner to state the facts of what he termed the suspicious circumstances surrounding the case. The court, however, will not announce the finding until Thursday morning at 10 o'clock.

## NEW POTATO PEST THREATENING CROPS OF HIS DISTRICT

Green Fly Playing Havoc With Next Year's Spuds.

The farmers this year are not only to be bothered by the destructive "cow fly," but another pest has come into the limelight in the shape of a tiny green fly, which abounds on the potatoes. This small fly is almost invisible to the naked eye and works on the under side of the leaf. The first sign of this tiny insect's presence is noted when the leaf of the potatoes start to curl up and then if immediate action is not taken the plant is destroyed in the course of a week. It does not wither up as in some cases, but its growth is stopped, and the potatoes do not get to any size. This is particularly harmful to this district, as the potatoes are all late ones, and this enables the fly to have plenty of time to work.

Many farmers are being surprised by this fly, as they had not the slightest idea of its presence, and were unable to look closely at their plants, as they were so busily occupied at other work. But now that the presence of the pest is being announced it is thought that the farmers will take immediate action.

Never before has there been so much insect work on the under side of the leaf, a small hand in the matter, which makes the work much longer.

**RAILWAY BOARD MAY ANNOUNCE INCREASE IN FREIGHT RATES**  
Adoption of McAdoo Scale Necessitates Raising Revenue.

OTTAWA, July 23.—While no definite announcement with regard to the proposed increase in freight rates, resulting from the adoption of the McAdoo scale of rates for freight by employees of the Canadian roads has yet been made, it is understood that a statement regarding this will be given out by the railway commission in a few days.

Officials of the Canadian railways are now working with members of the railway board, and the result of this conference will probably be a public statement in the near future. The board will increase the expenses of the railways by several million dollars, which will be balanced by an increase in freight rates.
