"Your Lord, My Lord," New Name For City's Mayor

Aldermen's Effort to Please Chair Poorly Rewarded.

The recommendation of the board of works that the cost of gravelling Hyman street, between Wellington and Richmond streets, be charged to the residents of the block in question, has been the subject of a long and heated discussion at last night's council meeting. The cost of this work is about \$200.

Mayor Somerville asked if there were any objections to the recommendation. "Yes, your Lord, or rather my Lord, there is," said Ald. Wilson, thereby introducing a new cognomen for the mayor.

The alderman contended that such a charge should be paid by the city at large. The residents of the street would pay for the grading, etc.

A merry little battle ensued. Ald. Wilson spoke to his amendment, and then attempted to speak in reply to other aldermen in support of his amendment. He has attempted this before and failed, being ruled out of order by the mayor.

He started his reply last night by asking questions of the engineer. Ald. Keene interrupted to ask if Ald. Wilson was making a speech or asking questions, contending that he was out of order.

Ald. Wilson replied that he was asking questions, "and I am answering them myself." Mayor Somerville then said that Ald. Keene was quite correct in his contention that Ald. Wilson was out of order, but he was going to let him go ahead.

Ald. Wilson did. The vote proved a tie, 7 to 7, on his amendment that the city at large pay for the work. Mayor Somerville broke the tie by voting against Ald. Wilson, thereby placing the cost of fixing the road on the residents of the street. Ald. Wilson lives on the block in question.

Ald. Wilson's contention is that the work on this street should be paid for out of the \$5,000 raised by placing 10¢ to 15¢ on his amendment that the city at large pay for the work. This council on June 17th decided that this money should be used to repair the streets of the city. Ald. Wilson made the motion.

"Not a dollar of that money has been turned over to the engineer as yet," declared Ald. Wilson. "Where they put it I don't know, but I intend to find out."

ASK SOLICITOR WHAT TO DO WITH CHARGES AGAINST FIRE DEPT.

Council Wants To Know What Liability Is Assumed.

ORDERS CARS RESTORED

Aldermen Vote to Have Street Railway Resume Former Service.

WHAT THE COUNCIL DID:

Referred the Tozer and Trades and Labor charges against the fire department to the solicitor for his advice on what action should be taken.

Voted to grant the request of the Trades and Labor Council for permission to withdraw its charges.

Decided to recommend to the militia authorities that the new military hospital be named "London View Military Hospital."

Decided to give notice to the London and Eastern Railway to restore its service to the schedule provided by the by-law by October 1st.

Refused the application of an east end deputations asking that several sidewalks be laid down.

The council last night again discussed at length the fire department trouble. It was introduced in several ways. The Trades and Labor Council's request for permission to withdraw its charges launched the first. Ald. W. Wilson started the second, when he introduced a motion that Capt. Tozer be removed from the council.

The council was responsible for the third, when he pleaded with the council to wind up the matter up. "For heaven's sake let us get it done with," he said.

Vote To Grant Request.

On a vote on the request of the Trades and Labor Council that it be allowed to withdraw its charges, being satisfied that what was complained of has either been fixed up or is under way, the council voted 6 to 5 to grant it. Mayor Somerville, however, ruled that to withdraw the charges from the council would have to be rescinded its former decision, and this could only be done by a two-thirds vote. No such motion was presented. Later in the evening there was a motion that the city solicitor be instructed to prepare and prosecute the city before the judge the charges, which would include both the Trades and Labor charges and the charges of the city.

Another motion's delay," said Ald. Keene. The discussion on the whole matter was lengthy. Ald. Wilson presented a motion that Capt. Tozer be put back on the fire department and his wages paid for the time he has been off. Mayor Somerville pointed out that such a motion had been previously defeated, and an amendment carried that the matter should be referred to the city solicitor.

Strong Objection Taken to the Assumption That "London Is On the Lake."

PORTENT OF CLOSER UNION IN CHURCHES WELCOMED IN CITY

Church of England's Attitude Toward Others Changed.

AWAY FROM NARROW ERA

Men at Front Protest Against Sectarianism of Past, Says Recto.

"Most decidedly a new feeling has rapidly grown up in the Church of England in the past few years towards other denominations, and also an attitude which has taken place in regard to the desirability for closer co-operation with these. We are looking to better things in the future."

The foregoing statement was made today by The Advertiser by Rev. W. Leslie Armstrong, rector of St. James' Church, South London, in regard to the stand on church union taken by the delegation representing the Church of England at the General Synod of the Church of England in session in Toronto, and the evident sympathy with the idea of closer union in operation between the Presbyterian and Anglican churches voiced by the Bishop of Montreal and Archbishop Paterson-Smythe of Montreal.

Organic Union Coming.

"People who would consider the subject of church union the standpoint of expressions used in the synod yesterday," continued Armstrong, "have become very open-minded. They are feeling very strongly that there must not only be closer union of spirit between the churches, but greater co-operation, looking eventually to organic union."

"Men who were formerly extremely narrow in their views have in the last two or three years taken part with different denominations in union services, and in some cases have been invited to preach from churches of other denominations. There is a ruling of long standing in the Church of England to the effect that it really does not apply today. It was made for a time some hundreds of years ago when there was utter darkness and confusion of mind."

End Narrow Sectarianism.

"The war has awakened us to a realization that what is required to carry on the war successfully in Europe is the union of the Christian forces, eliminating of religious and closer co-operation in order to use the forces to the best advantage. Our men at the front are protesting against a religion of narrow sectarianism and the chaplains are experiencing the same feelings in their hearts. They are turning to one another, as would never have been the case before. Our returned chaplains are giving us a different view of life and awakening us to the difference between essentials and non-essentials."

Alliance Regrets That Rev. J. Boyd Is Leaving City

Ministers Give Eulogies at Farewell Banquet on Monday.

"That this Ministerial Alliance expresses its deep sense of regret at the departure of Rev. J. Boyd from London; that it wishes to testify to its appreciation of the services rendered in connection with the spiritual and material welfare of the community while he was pastor of Adelaide Street Baptist Church; that it assures him of its continued interest in his work in his new field of labor, and prays that he may have the richest blessing of God in all his efforts for the extension of the kingdom."

The above resolution, moved by Rev. D. C. Macdonald and seconded by Rev. J. B. McKillop, was unanimously passed at a farewell banquet, which was given Rev. J. Boyd by the Ministerial Alliance in the dining hall of Smallman & Ingham Monday evening.

Temperance Work.

Rev. W. J. Ashton and Rev. H. H. Bingham, speaking in support of the motion expressed their appreciation of the good work which Rev. J. H. Boyd had done as chairman of the Temperance forces of the city and for his fearless pronouncements on public questions in his own church and on the public platform as well. He was also eulogized for his work in starting the year at the Western Fair. Congratulations were extended on his promotion in the ministry. He leaves October 1 to take charge of the Beverly Road Baptist Church at Toronto.

Appreciates Good Feeling.

Rev. Mr. Boyd in a brief address expressed his appreciation of the good feelings shown him by his brother ministers of the city. He would always have a warm corner in his heart for the London preachers. The kindly manner in which he had been welcomed, and the courtesy shown him during his stay in London he could never repay. He thought he assured the association that it was with some regrets that he transferred his labors to a new field.

Rev. Byron Steel, president of the Ministerial Alliance, presided at the banquet.
