LEFT IN HIS PLACE
BY UTTER STRANGERJudgment Reserved in Case of
Joe Berbesch.

SIX GALLONS IN SHED

So Charge of Having It For
Sale Was Laid by the
Police.

Judgment was reserved for a week by Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon in the case of Joe Berbesch, a Russian, who was in police court this morning charged with having liquor for sale.

Inspector J. E. Keenleyside went to the house, 538 Philip street, and confiscated six one-gallon tins of alcohol which were lying in a canvas sack in the back shed. Analysis proved that the liquid contained 78.7 per cent alcohol by volume, and 84.4 per cent alcohol by volume, and 148.03 per cent proof spirits.

Berbesch stated that at 1 o'clock in the afternoon a stranger came into his house, laid the bag on the floor and out. Then the police came.

Exactly one year ago today the accused found a tin of alcohol in a shed. He admitted, but would not admit that the six gallons which were found were not of a consistent forty gallons that had been said to have been in his possession.

His wife had not seen the alcohol at any time.

It is not lawful to have alcohol in any place, not even a private dwelling, without a permit, as this liquid is intended for manufacturing purposes only.

OPINIONS ASKED ON
THAT TIME QUESTIONManufacturers Invited To Ex-
press Their Views.

Mayor C. R. Somerville is awaiting expressions of opinion on the continuance of daylight saving. An advertisement was inserted in local papers asking the manufacturing interests in the city to give their views on the advisability of continuing the plan until the end of October or ending at midnight next Sunday.

The city has no power to deal with the matter, but the mayor will make known the expressions of opinion sent to him and will urge action along the lines suggested. The city council operates on standard time as do the street railway and some factories. It is a matter of choice for other institutions, but many are governed by the railroad timetables, which will continue on daylight saving time until the end of the season.

Ald. C. G. Moorhead, who moved the resolution appointing Mayor Somerville and City Clerk S. Baker a committee to inquire into the matter, says that he speaks for a large number of workmen in urging that citizens revert to standard time. He points out that many of the workmen rise now before it is daylight and have to wait until it is gained at night is lost then. Workmen have told him that they realize that the room is governed by the train schedules. They condemn the railroads for what they do, but they do not want to have the daylight saving time on the country. If daylight saving is continued until the end of October the season will then be within six weeks of the shortest day in the year.

MUSICAL FESTIVAL
ON BIG SCALE FOR
PRINCE'S VISIT HEREFour Local Bands and Other
Outside Organizations.

A musical festival, surpassing anything which the city has seen before, will be one of the features of the Prince of Wales' visit in October. The band committee of the general reception committee met this morning and discussed the matter.

Four local bands will participate in the parade and review of troops, in addition to giving concerts on the main streets during the carnival in the evening. The four local bands which will take part are the 1st Hussars, the 7th Regiment, the Great War Veterans and the Marconi Club.

To Bring Others.

Major J. H. Woodward, chairman of the committee, was given power to arrange for bands from outside points. He has already communicated with organizations at Clinton and St. Thomas, and in Lambton, Waterloo and Oxford counties.

It is not likely that the bands will be massed except for the playing of the National Anthem during the review of the troops at Carling Heights. They will each render separate programs. Following the inspection they will lead the heights through Wolsley Barracks compound, down Rattle street to Adelaide street, along Adelaide street to Dundas street, and thence to the centre of the city.

Evening Program.

Their arrival there will end the afternoon's program, but after an hour's rest the bands will be commenced at the main street intersections from Talbot street to Waterloo street on Dundas, and from King street to Queen's avenue on Richmond street. In addition to this a band will be parading the streets. Platforms will be erected on the street corners so that the moving crowds will not interfere with the bandmen.

SUCCESS IS HEALTH,
SAYS DOCTOR; URGES
DRUG, BOOZE REMOVALDr. R. C. Barkle On "Health
and Business Efficiency"
in Ad Club Talk.

For over a half hour, Dr. R. C. Barkle of this city held the attention of the London Advertising Club at the initial banquet of the season at the Tecumseh House on Wednesday night, when he gave a very interesting and instructive address on "Health and Business Efficiency." Health, he said, was without doubt the supreme question of the world. There was a tremendous amount of illness on the earth today.

Referring to the impure water of some cities, he said that it could not be made pure by adding something to it, but only by taking the poison from it. In the human body the prevention of the cause of a disease removed the possibility of a secondary disease or of an operation.

Scores Drug Sales.

Dr. Barkle scored the people of the present century for allowing drugs to be sold to a person, especially those addicted to drugs. Although there was a social service organization and men's federations, this was allowed to continue. "We should remove all drugs which have a disastrous effect on a fellow-citizen, the speaker told the club. Liquor was another thing that should be removed. From the aspect of health it was very injurious.

In reference to the length of a working day he declared, "I hold that a man if he does nine hours' work of any kind whatever, he's gone a big day's labor. Recreation 'should occupy six hours per day. There was something wrong with the health of every man on the street. 'Men have an idea,' he told the club, 'that they can do a whole lot with a body and get away with it. 'Persons who did not do laborious work should not eat heavy meals. Everyone should occupy at least 30 minutes for each meal. The greatest trouble with London's citizens was nervousness or lack of business stability.

Success, he remarked, was not the building of some high building or other accomplishment, but was good health. 'Success is within,' he declared. Sleep and plenty of fresh air were essential to good health.

Insurance statistics showed that a high percentage of deaths occurred during early life. A person ought to be as good at 80 as at 40," Dr. Barkle asserted.

Houses Too Warm.

Houses of this country were kept too warm. The temperature in a house should be about 68° F. People of the present age did not open their windows enough. Farmers especially failed to observe this rule. Clothing worn was too heavy also.

Diet was an important matter. It should not be heavy, and the food should be thoroughly masticated. Rotten teeth should be pulled out and false ones put in their place. The lecturers in the United States plans for regulating diets was being made.

"Men should drink a great deal of water."

Children growing who were not in the best of health should be confined to some institution where they could receive the necessary treatment in order that they might grow to be strong men and women.

Veneral diseases should be treated by the patient being taken away to an institution where he would be isolated from civilization, the doctor said.

Arthur Frederick Sheldon, the world's greatest businessman, has arranged to speak at the Auditorium on October 23, 30 and 31. There are 702 seats available, but 500 of these have been taken by the Ad Club and the Underwriters, leaving but 200 for sale. The lectures comprise a special course for men. Among the subjects dealt with are "Salesmanship, the World's Greatest Asset." On the last night "The Industrial Rest" will be explained.

With George Wenig as captain, the Ad Club is raising a team to take part in the Y.M.C.A. campaign which starts on October 6.

STANDARD OIL BOATS
WILL BE DISTRIBUTED
AMONG ALLIED POWERS

New York, Sept. 25.—Twelve American-owned steamships, aggregating 70,000 dead weight tons, and valued at more than \$10,000,000, the property of a German subsidiary of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, have been ordered from German ports to the Fifth of Forth for allocation among the allied and associated nations recently at war against Germany. This information has been received by officials of the Standard Oil Company from its representatives abroad.

The action has been protested by the Standard Oil Company through the American state department and the United States shipping board.
