Trotzky foresaw the need of munitions during the frantic effort made to capture the Polish capital, and made plans accordingly, but was too late. He crossed into Germany and reached an agreement with representatives of the German Covernment, by which it would supply ammunition to the Bol-

shevikl.

"The ammunition has been paid for in part, out of the soviet "jewel fund," which includes the crown jewels. It was the intention of the Bolsheviki to reserve this fund solely for propaganda purposes in the east, but Germany insisted upon cash payment.
