Charles Gibbins, Lynden, was fined \$5 this morning for breaking the Lord's Day Act by hoeing on Sunday.


G. Leckofsky, 64 Lovelock-street, has been missing for several days, and his family are much alarmed for his safety.

TWO RAILWAY DISPUTES YIELD TO CONCILIATORS

G. T. P. and C. N. R. Employes Benefit as Result of Having Their Case Heard by Boards.

OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—(Special.)—The department of labor has received news of the satisfactory adjustment of two disputes which had threatened to interrupt the operations of the G. T. P. and the Canadian Northern in western Canada.

The dispute on the lines of the Canadian Northern arose out of differences between that company and its maintenance of ways employes, in connection with proposed reduction by the company of five cents per day in their wages. The award of the board of conciliation was in this case in favor of the employes. The company was at first unwilling to accept the award, but the labor department is now inclined to covering all the points in dispute.

The dispute between the G. T. P. and its engineers, firemen, conductors, brakemen, baggage men and yard men related to schedule of rates of pay and rules governing the service of various classes of employes, and to the dismissal of certain classes of employes. The board of conciliation has recommended that the rates of pay be increased and that the dismissal of employes be discontinued.

The conciliation board reported unanimously that all matters in dispute were amicably settled except the claim of employes that engineers detained on their engines at terminals for two hours or more before commencing their trip will be remunerated for the detention. The majority of the board was disposed to agree with this contention, but the company laid stress upon the fact that the road being in constructive stage, the difficulties were great.

However, a schedule agreement was drawn up to which, the department is informed, the parties have agreed. This will remain in force for one year.

KILLED IN SHOVELING ASHES

Finlander Came in Contact With a Live Wire.

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont., Aug. 16.—(Special.)—The body of a man, who was taken from the river by a couple of fishermen who had been out for a trip in a launch. At first it was supposed the body was that of a sailor, but later investigation proved it to be that of an unknown Finlander. In the pockets of the coat were found handkerchiefs, showing that the man had been a suicide or had met foul play. The clothes bore the stamp of a Milwaukee firm.

Finlander's Contact. A Finlander was killed at the works of the Lake Superior Corporation by coming in contact with a live wire while shoveling ashes into a car. The electrician at the plant says that only 102 volts were on at the time.

ARCHBISHOP'S REBUKE. Reference to Parish Priest as Serving Political Party. MONTREAL, Aug. 16.—(Special.)—The intimation by His Grace the Archbishop of St. Boniface, in an address to a large number of his clergy, that Rev. Father Berube, parish priest of Vanda, Sask., had placed his pen at the disposition of the Liberal party, in order to receive public opinion for a little more than 30 pieces of silver, has naturally caused no little commotion in this French and Catholic Province of Quebec.

For months past Father Berube, who came from the Quebec district, has been sending letters to The Soleil and The Vigie of the ancient capital, showing that Catholics of the west are fairly well off in educational matters, and especially advocating the three western provinces as a profitable field for French-Canadian emigration.

This policy has, however, incensed the majority of the western clergy, and they sent an indignant protest to his grace of St. Boniface against the claims of the parish priest of Vanda. Mr. Langlois, in replying to this document, congratulates the clergy for their protest, and says: "Be a thousand times blessed for behaving so earnestly for the good of the city. You prove in fact, how faithful is the Catholic priesthood when it inspires thoughts of faith and true patriotism, instead of putting its pen at the service of a political party to deceive public opinion for the sake of a little more than 30 pieces of silver."

SHEET IRON FELL ON HIM. 800 Pound Piece Takes Leg Off a Brantford Man. BRANTFORD, Aug. 16.—(Special.)—John Cornish, an employe of the Watkinson Engine Works, was fatally injured this afternoon.

He was helping unload a car of sheet iron by means of a crane, and one of the pieces, weighing 800 pounds, when suspended about ten feet in the air, fell, leveling the unfortunate fellow to the ground, and inflicting severe internal injuries. Cornish was warned not to stand under the iron when it was swinging. He was removed to the hospital, but no hope is held out for his recovery.

Canadians at Disadvantage. OTTAWA, Aug. 16.—(Special.)—There will be no Palma trophy matches this year. Great Britain will not send a team to Seagirt, nor will Canada. The competition lost something of its popularity when it was shot for here two years ago, owing to the loose regulations governing the question of sights. The Canadian team had to shoot with their regular military service rifle sights, while the Americans, who won, were allowed to use the peep sight, which it is claimed, giving them an immense advantage.
