ITALIAN PRISONERS COLLAPSE

When Given Long Prison Terms fo Counterfeiting.

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—Lupo, "The Wolf," chief of blackhand in America; Giuseppe Morello, chief of 'Sicilian unterfeiters in this country, and six of their confederates, were found guilty of making spurious money and were sentenced to hard labor in the federal prison at Atlanta, Ga., for terms vary ing from fifteen years and \$1000 fine to thirty years and \$1000 fine.
