### CANADA PASSES OBJECTIVE IN VICTORY LOAN

Ontario, Too, Has Got More  
Than Was Aimed at for  
the Province.

Canada has exceeded her Victory Loan objective of \$80,000,000. At midnight last night reports at provincial and Dominion headquarters showed a total of over \$80,000,000, with Ontario the only province reporting complete figures. The unrecorded totals from the other provinces, from which points reports are one to three days behind, would add greatly to the total, which when all the returns are in on Monday night is expected to show at least \$100,000,000.

Ontario yesterday subscribed \$14,784,000. Welland with \$445,000, Wellington \$201,350, Oxford \$225,350, Karna \$42,200, and Parry Sound \$30,350, arriving too late to be included in the official total shown elsewhere.

Yesterday was the largest yet in Ontario since the campaign opened, but it is confidently felt by G. H. Wood, provincial chairman, that today will make an even better showing.

Ontario, outside Toronto, is now over the \$101,000,000 mark, or \$25,000,000 greater than its objective, while Toronto reports \$48,000,000, leaving \$12,000,000 to be obtained on the final day to reach the total asked for from this city. Hamilton, the largest city in Ontario cities, has subscribed more so far than the whole Province of Quebec outside of Montreal.

Race Against Time. Toronto's Victory Loan campaign has developed into a race against time with strong possibilities of time being beaten. Yesterday the total sale of bonds was increased to \$96,000,000, with the untiring workers turning in \$4,700,000 after a hard day's grind. This amount represented about 7000 subscriptions, so some idea can be gained of just what a task was accomplished under the direction of R. J. Fleming's special extension committee. ### TURKS AND BULGARIANS ARE MUCH DISSATISFIED

Berlin Playing for U. S. Action  
Against Her Allies to Increase  
Their War Ardor.

Boston, Nov. 30.—The Turks are heartily tired of German rule, and a declaration of war by the United States against Turkey now would be playing into the hands of the Berlin officials in the opinion of Dr. Wm. E. Strong, editorial secretary of the American board of commissioners for foreign missions.

"If war should be declared on Turkey and Bulgaria, what could the United States do?" asked Dr. Strong in a statement issued tonight. "It would be the extreme to make an attack upon a people who hate the alliance with Germany with a perfect hatred that all would gladly break that alliance if they had the power to do so.

We have reason to know that the Bulgarian and Turkish officials are increasingly friendly to the United States as they become dissatisfied and even hostile to German rule. This is a tendency to be encouraged rather than discouraged.

The sending of Bernstein to Constantinople was with the idea of turning Turkey against the United States. In the face of the rising tide of German opposition in Turkey he will be unable to do so, unless the United States, by a declaration of war, plays into his hands and into the hands of the Berlin officials."

## GERMANS LAUNCH STRONG OFFENSIVE IN CAMBRAI REGION

### TEMPORARY SUCCESS GAINED BY GERMANS

Enemy, in Wide Attack on Cambrai Front, Makes Slight Advance, But Is Being Pushed Back.

The British Army Headquarters in France, Nov. 30.—The Germans in a violent counter-attack today over the entire front where the British made their gain last week have pushed General Byng's troops at several points. Especially violent was the attack between the Bourlon Wood and Meuse, where the British line was driven back to the vicinity of the Bapaume-Cambrai road north of Graincourt. The distance of about two miles. Likewise on the southern base the enemy drove thru from Gonnelle to Gouzeaucourt—another two miles. The Village of Lavacourt was captured by the Germans, but later in a counter-attack was recovered. Other counter-attacks have driven the enemy from Gouzeaucourt and the ridge to the east.

Hard fighting is still in progress over the greater portion of the fifteen-mile front.

The text of the London war office communication dealing with these operations, follows: "At eight o'clock this morning, after a violent bombardment, the enemy attacked with strong forces, on a wide front south of Cambrai, between Vendhuile and Crevecoeur-Burlescourt. Shortly afterward heavy attacks also developed against our positions west of Cambrai in the neighborhood of Bourlon Wood and Meusevres.

"From Masnières to Meusevres all the enemy attacks have been repulsed after many hours of severe fighting during which great losses were inflicted upon the German infantry by our artillery and machine gun fire.

"South of Masnières Village, from the neighborhood of Bonais to Villers-Guislain, the enemy succeeded in entering our positions at different points and penetrated as far as Lavacourt and Gouzeaucourt. Our counter-attacks have already regained Lavacourt and we have driven back the enemy from Gouzeaucourt and the ridge to the east of that village. At other points the enemy's advance has been checked. The fighting is continuing."

Was Pretextitious Assault. An Associated Press despatch from British Army headquarters in France says: The Germans delivered a pretextitious assault in force this (Friday) morning on the British positions between Bourlon Wood and Meusevres, where the British line was driven back to the vicinity of the Bapaume-Cambrai road, just north of Graincourt.

The British, after the first shock, immediately organized a counter-attack and flung themselves against the advancing Germans. Late today it was reported that the British had succeeded in pushing back the enemy, altho the latter was resisting fiercely.

### EIGHT ENEMY MACHINES BROUGHT DOWN IN WEST

British Airmen Also Drop Hundreds of Bombs on Positions of Enemy. London, Nov. 30.—The British official communication dealing with aviation, issued this evening, says: "With a distinct improvement in the weather Thursday, a full day's flying was possible. Work with the artillery was successfully carried out by our airplanes, many photographs were taken, and several thousand rounds were fired into the enemy's infantry from low altitudes.

"During the day 199 bombs were dropped on a large ammunition dump north of Cambrai, on the Roulers railway station, and on hostile billets in the battle area. Enemy aircraft were very active in attempting to interfere with artillery and photographic machines.

"Eight fighting five hostile machines were downed and two driven down out of control. Another hostile machine was shot down by machine gun fire from the ground. Three of our machines are missing."

### DISAVOW LANDOWNE'S SUGGESTION FOR PEACE

British Cabinet Ministers and Members of Unionist Party Repudiate All Connection Therewith—Germans Delighted Over Proposition of British Peer.

London, Nov. 30.—The letter of the Marquis of Lansdowne, one of Great Britain's leading statesmen, pleading for a re-statement of the war aims of the entente allies and forming an action to secure peace before "the prolongation of the war leads to the ruin of the civilized world," is still the theme for bitter discussion in England.

Lord Robert Cecil, minister of blockade, in his weekly talk with the Associated Press today, declared emphatically that the Marquis of Lansdowne's letter was a "strongly worded repudiation of the suggestion, was not speaking for an important body of opinion in England."

"The chancellor further declared that the views expressed by Lansdowne were not the views of any of his colleagues, either in the cabinet or out of it. A strongly worded repudiation of the suggestion, was not speaking for an important body of opinion in England."

"Turco-German artillery again made its objective the mosque erected on the traditional site of the tomb of the prophet Samuel. This site is held in great reverence by Christians, Mohammedans and Jew. The minaret has been destroyed by this bombardment."

"A detachment of forty men from an eastern county regiment attacked a Turkish post on the Nahr-el-Ajlej, held by a garrison of about one hundred men. Fifty Turks were killed and our detachment brought in prisoners and a machine gun.

### MAY YET SIDETRACK RUSSIAN ARMISTICE

Allies to Treat Bolsheviki Tactfully, in Hope of Keeping Them True to Entente.

Washington, Nov. 30.—No surprise is felt in diplomatic circles here at the speedy acceptance by Germany and Austria of the Lenin proposals.

It had been assumed that with no intention whatever of accepting any of the substantial demands of the Bolsheviki, the German and Austrian chancelleries would not miss this great opportunity to eliminate Russia as an active military force for the many days, weeks, or even months, during which the skilled German diplomats might protract the negotiations for an armistice and peace.

In the meantime, of course, there may be released for active service against the British, French and Italians on the west front hundreds of thousands of German, Austrian, Turkish and Bulgarian soldiers maintained on the eastern front.

It will be for the inter-allied conference in Paris to devise some means for neutralizing this German scheme, possibly by influencing the Bolsheviki element itself thru an exposition of the duplicity and real aims of the Germans or by recourse to the elements in Russia represented by General Kaedines and other leaders who have refused to acknowledge the control of the Maximalists.

Appeals Can Be Filed Until December Tenth. Extension Notice, Approved by Minister of Justice and Justice Duff, Sent Out.

Ottawa, Nov. 30.—The date for filing appeals from decisions of local exemption tribunals has been extended until Monday, Dec. 10. Under the Military Service Act regulations the time for filing appeals was limited to "three clear days after the date on which notice of the decision of the tribunal was received by the applicant or his military representative."

Some misunderstanding appears to have arisen, however, in regard to the right to appeal, and applicants or military representatives have allowed the time limit to expire.

Provision for the extension is made on the authority of the minister of justice with the approval of Hon. Justice Duff, central appeal judge.

BRITISH WURRY CONSOLIDATION OF NEW FRONT

Engineers Do Little Short of Miraculous Work Before Cambrai.

MUCH FIRING GOES ON

Germans Increase Artillery Force—Not Yet Equal to Flanders.

British Army Headquarters in France, Thursday, Nov. 29.—The British have virtually completed the consolidation of the greater part of the area wrenched from the enemy in the Cambrai push. The work accomplished in a few days is little short of miraculous and today, throughout much territory recently held by the enemy, the well-oiled British war machine is running like clockwork.

The famous Hindenburg line has been so thoroughly punctured by well built highways and tracks that the famous German defences seem little more than a myth.

The Germans brought considerable anti-artillery into this region to replace the guns that General Byng captured, but their fire is still weak compared with that on the Flanders front. The correspondent in visit today to the forward areas, found Bourlon Wood and the surrounding country under very heavy enemy gunfire, with frequent barrages of gas shells. This afternoon the big guns poured a deluge of explosives along the ridge just south of Meusevres.

Graincourt, Annez and Hiesquieres and other towns are being methodically shelled and Graincourt rapidly is being reduced to a pile of bricks. Cambrai appeared thus far to have escaped the ravages of the artillery.

The civilian population of Cambrai, after living three years almost like prisoners under the iron rule of the Prussians, have been evacuated.

### LENINE GOVERNMENT HAS BEEN OVERTHROWN

Coalition Cabinet of Socialists Now in Power in Russia, Including Some of Bolsheviki.

London, Nov. 30.—The government of Nikolai Lenin has fallen, according to a Petrograd despatch to The Daily Chronicle dated Wednesday. It has been succeeded by a coalition cabinet of advanced socialists, in which, however, the Bolsheviki are represented.

The Maximalists, with the social revolutionaries of the left and the Minimalists, Internationalists, have arrived at an agreement concerning the organization of the governing powers of Russia. A people's council is being formed, consisting of 100 representatives of the central executive committee of the workers and soldiers' delegates, 100 representatives of the present's delegates, 100 representatives of the army and navy, 100 representatives of the trades unions and 15 representatives of the railway unions.

### WILSON WILL COMPEL LIFTING OF EMBARGOES

President Will Use Control of Imports as Weapon Against Other Countries.

Washington, Nov. 30.—Government control of imports, just put into operation by President Wilson, will be used to its fullest extent, it was made known tonight, to force the release to America at fair prices of war supplies now held by other countries under embargo.

In a statement outlining an import policy, the war trade board, which has organized a bureau to license imports, makes it clear that countries receiving American exports are expected to reciprocate by shipping more freely commodities needed by the United States from abroad to prosecute the war successfully.

"Prior to the enactment of the recent legislation," says the statement, "there was no government bureau especially designated to deal with the proper officials of other governments in order to procure the release of commodities required by the United States and which had been embargoed by other governments. Governmental supervision of imports makes possible a more effective scheme of reciprocity and brings about a closer unity of the countries associated together in the war."
