Chicago, Feb. 15.—Wheat developed strength today on reports that Grain Britain would give preference to the importation of food stuffs and munitims of war because of the scarcity of vessels. The market, however, was largely a scalping affair, the disposition being to await developments in the transportation and political situations.
