

Carpet Company Manager
Replies to Critics Regarding Settlers.

Mrs. Rose Hodson, secretary of the Women's Labor League of Ontario, stated in an interview with The Toronto World yesternay afternoon that a carpet manufacturing company in the city, which had a representative in Britain, had brought out women from both Asminster and Halifax to work as Axminster setters and weavers and had promised them a wage of between \$20 and \$25 a week. The passage of the women had been paid to Canada, but many of the women when they arrived found no locms for them to work at, and the wages turned out to be twelve and fourteent dollars a week instead of the Capected twenty or twenty-five dollars a week. Up to date the firm had brought out 32 swomen for this work. These, it was true, were getting much less than \$20 a week, \$14 and \$15 to be correct. There were perhaps six of the thirty-two women sent over to Toronco from Sanister and Halifax, who were receiving the lower wages. These were the facts.
