

seem to prize and enjoy the social means of grace, as well as the public services of the sanctuary. Our congregations are good and very attentive. At Perrytown, the congregation has more than doubled during the year, and is still increasing in numbers and interest.

PICKERING.—A few have been induced to forsake sin, and lay hold on the hope set before them in the Gospel. The members of the church have been consistent and faithful in their confession of Christ before men. We have erected a small church at Frenchman's Bay, the entire cost of which was provided for at the dedication.

PRINCE ALBERT.—It affords us pleasure to be able to report that generally, we live in peace. Our congregations continue about as usual, and class and prayer meetings moderately well attended. Special meetings have been held at two places, with some apparent fruit. The debt on the Parsonage has been lessened to the amount of \$70. The S. School department is encouraging. Our greatest want is a more entire consecration of all we have and are to God.

PETERBORO.—The special services, held during the year, resulted in the ingathering of a few souls in each place, while those who were admitted last year, are, many of them, holding on their way. The Sabbath Schools are in an encouraging condition; and while affording a sphere for Christian activity, are the means of exciting our hope in the future prosperity of the cause. During the year, a portion of the debt on the Peterboro property has been paid off, and the church finances put in a more favorable condition. The attendance on the public services are, on the whole, encouraging; but what we want is a more complete consecration to God, and a fuller baptism of the Holy Ghost.

ASHBURNHAM.—As a Society we are sorry we are unable to report a larger ingathering of souls; yet there is room for thankfulness, in as much as some souls have been saved, and we are able to return three members above the members returned last year, after losing several through removals, death, etc. Financially, some of the friends have done nobly, when we take into consideration the depressed state of trade, and the hardness of the times generally. After the first Quarter, we formed a Bible Class, which meets on Tuesday evening; it is well attended and not wanting in interest.

MANVERS & CARTWRIGHT.—During the year, the work on the Circuit has proceeded evenly and peacefully. The congregations in some places have improved a little. Our membership is about the same as last year.
