

APPARITION IN SKY OVER DUBLIN

City Agitated by Story and Crowds Assemble Each Night to Watch

The Dublin correspondent of a London paper of July 29 says: The story that apparitions have been seen in the sky has been responsible for some remarkable scenes in Dublin for the last few nights after dark.

From about ten o'clock until after midnight crowds assemble in the streets in various parts of the city watching the night sky for a return of the phenomenon.

Rumors of the apparitions first began to be circulated in the city on Monday. So far there are only three points in the city where the statement is made that the apparitions were seen on successive nights by scores of people.

On the north side of the city, in the vicinity of Broadstone railway station and in the Donnelly street area, it is also emphatically declared that the vision was seen on Tuesday night, between half past ten and half past eleven.

Sober-minded citizens are suggesting that an alibi or aeroplane has been used to a great height over the city, thus giving rise to the whole story by aid of the fevered imagination of a few people.

The majority of the people are inclined to scoff at the whole thing, but in the popular mind it is treated with a great deal of solemnity.
