Cross Defeated Wolgast.  
New York, June 2.—Leach Cross, of New York, outthought Ad Wolgast, former lightweight champion, in a ten-round bout here tonight. Cross had a decided advantage in every round but the fourth, when Wolgast showed a little of his old time form and used a left to the body effectively. Cross weighed 136 and Wolgast 137 pounds.
