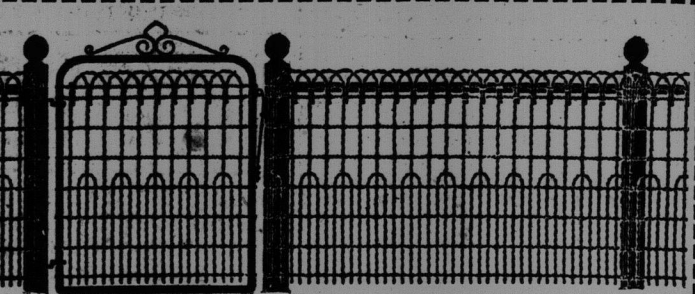

MIGHT SECURE REVENUE FROM AUTO PARKING

Mayor Makes Suggestion When Subject Up At City Hall

KING STREET EAST REPORT IS MADE

Street Matters Chief Topic of Meeting of Council Committee

Commissioner Prink reported to the committee of the Common Council this morning that he proposed to lay a six-foot concrete walk in the path on the south side of the Old Burying Ground, the estimated cost of which is \$1,000, in connection with opening of a new auto parking area in King Street east. Mayor White suggested that the city lease the auto parking privileges and receive some revenue in that way.

The Eastern Trust Company, acting for the DeLury estate, which owns that Visar street for a part of its length was 50 feet wide and for the rest of its length 60 feet wide. They asked if something could be done to do away with the jog where the street widened. This was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works for a report.

OFFERS LAND TO CITY.

The Saint John Horticultural Society, through the secretary, Dr. King Hagen, offered to deed to the city a part of the public gardens at the southeast corner, to allow for widening the road at this dangerous curve. This was also referred to the Commissioner of Public Works.

Commissioner Prink reported that he had received letters from the Mayors of Edmonton, Calgary, Fort William and St. Catharines endorsing refuse boxes which a client of J. H. A. L. Fairweather had offered to install on the sidewalks here. He said the city solicitor had expressed the opinion that if these were placed on the sidewalk the city would be liable to sue of damage. He will bring in a report and recommendations later.

PARKING QUESTION.

Commissioner Prink said he proposed to place a six-foot concrete walk in the present path on the south side of the Old Burying Ground, the estimated cost of which was \$1,000.20. He was not the intention to encroach on the section in which bodies had been buried. He understood the Historical Society intended to make a protest, and the Common Clerk said a protest had already been placed in his hands for the council meeting on next Tuesday.

The Mayor suggested that the city might lease the parking privilege to some person and add a little to the revenue in that way. He also suggested that the south side of King Square be made a one-way street, traffic moving from west to east.

Commissioner Prink will bring in an estimate of the cost of the walk laid with asphalt.

On motion of Commissioner Bullock, the tender of the A. R. Williams Machinery Co. of \$1,244 for the hoist and electric equipment for the new ramp at the steamer Empress dock was recommended to council for acceptance.

WORK BEING DONE ON ROTHESAY ROAD

Government and Saint John Crews Engaged—City Streets Get Attention

Motorists using the Rothesay Road, who have been complaining recently of its condition in some spots, and particularly that part of the highway within the city limits, received a doubly pleasant surprise on their way to the city this morning. A government crew was at work making repairs to the road beyond the One Mile House and the city public works department also had workmen engaged remedying the ruts between the One Mile House and the Marsh Bridge. The bridge over the creek at Brookville has received a new covering and is now in excellent condition.

The streets within the city also have been greatly improved during the last week, especially the bad portion of Charlotte and Main streets where a number of ruts existed.

Another Large Gain In Bank Clearings

Saint John bank clearings this week were \$3,347,204, compared with \$3,166,723 in the corresponding week last year—a gain of \$180,481. The figures in 1924 were \$2,019,269. Halifax clearings this week were \$5,158,699.

The annual Sunday school picnic of Carleton United Church is being held at Grand Bay today. Trains left Fairville Station at 9:25 and 1:25 o'clock. LeBaron Stubbs is the school superintendent and had charge of the games and sports. An efficient committee of ladies looked after the refreshments.

Two leaks have been discovered in the old No. 1 24-inch main. Commissioner Wigmore said this morning. The leaks are in Shillington's Mill, Silver Falls, and are not serious. Repairs are now being made.

TO AMALGAMATE DISCIPLES OF CHRIST IS PLAN

Saint John Members Take Proposal to P. E. I. Meeting

ONE CONVENTION FOR ALL MARITIMES

Island Now Separate Governing Body—Six Go From Here

Saint John members of the Disciples of Christ church are going to the annual convention of the church in Prince Edward Island to open on Friday at Montague, with a proposal for union of the churches in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island into one convention.

There is now one convention governing the churches in this province and Nova Scotia and another under which the church in P. E. Island operates. The proposal, if the union project is accepted, is to have a Maritime convention every year, in each province in turn. There will be a request, if the plan is adopted, to set apart Rev. Charles E. Armstrong, now pastor of the church at Montague, and formerly of Saint John, North End, as pastor evangelist who would spend some time in each province each year, the province in which he would be laboring at the time to be responsible for his salary during that period.

CONVENTION WILL BE IN WOODSTOCK

Maritime Baptist Meetings Next Month—Rev. Dr. Weeks to Attend

Unusual interest attends the announcement published in the denominational press that this year's Maritime Convention of the Baptist body will be held in Woodstock, N. B., Aug. 23 to 29 inclusive. It will be the first time this church parliament has convened in New Brunswick for several years. Most of the more recent conventions have taken place at the Baptist educational centre, Wolfville.

DR. WEEKS COMING.

Secretary Rev. Dr. S. S. Poole, pastor of the German street church, announces that the denominational addresses at the convention will be delivered by the Rev. W. W. Weeks, pastor of Grace Baptist church, Richmond, Va. Dr. Weeks is a Saint John man and a worker in the printer's trade here nearly 50 years ago. His first pastorate was in Brockville, Ont., followed by the occupancy of the pulpit in the First Baptist church, Moncton, and since in his present charge in Virginia. He is one of the ablest expositors of Bible truth in the Baptist denomination on the continent.

BIG PROGRAM.

Entertainment of delegates at the Woodstock convention will be on the Harvard plan—bed and breakfast. Other details are being worked out to be announced through the press and by circulation. The Baptist program, nationally and provincially, is a Maritime standpoint and as affecting the three lower provinces individually, is comprehensive one in its missionary and educational phases and general economics. Officials say the agenda will contain no matter for serious deliberation and of a heartening character.

SCHOOL AT KANE'S CORNER SUGGESTED

Count of Pupils is Made—Matter to Come up at District Meeting

Residents of East Saint John in School District No. 4 are discussing the school question. Some think a primary school ought to be opened at the Kane's Corner end of the district. As it is now, these state, more than half of the taxes is raised in this section, which makes no use of the school at Silver Falls.

A canvass of the residents of the district, it was said today, showed about 30 children there in Grades 1 and 2 and more than 40 below school age. It was added that this district had been improved in respect to water supply and sewerage and good roads and it was felt that school facilities were needed to encourage people to take up homes there.

The annual meeting of the trustees of District No. 4 will be held at 7:30 o'clock on next Monday evening in the school house at Silver Falls and it is expected this will be an interesting matter of discussion.
