### TOURIST BODY ELECTS OFFICERS

Report of C. B. Allan, Secretary, Presented—Delegates Guests of the Edmundston Board of Trade.

At the business meeting of the New Brunswick Tourist and Resources Association held yesterday in connection with the fourth annual convention at Edmundston the report of the secretary, C. B. Allan, for the year ending May 30 was read. It showed the finances to be as follows:—Receipts, \$3,092.20, and expenditures, \$2,682.25, leaving a balance of \$409.95. C. C. Avar, of Sackville, had been authorized to collect information for the publication of a new provincial booklet, "The Guides' Association sports at Marysville in August were mentioned. Several requests from students in the United States schools for information about the province had been received. The matter of the formation of a Protective Fish and Game Association and the later attempt to form an independent Fish, Forest and Game Protection Association for the purpose of developing and protecting the property at Musquash was outlined. The delegates were entertained yesterday afternoon by the Edmundston Board of Trade. The visitors went to Notre Dame Dulac, Quebec, by special train for dinner. Twenty-two names were added to the roll at this time. A number of toasts were drunk, and speeches were delivered by N. R. DesBrisay, C. B. Allan, F. W. Robertson and W. Harry Allen.

We were receiving a great many enquiries about the road conditions between St. John and St. Stephen, and had almost daily to advise travelers in the matter, and the information we received was so contradictory that I thought it advisable to go down over the road and find out at first hand the actual conditions. This I did and I am glad to be able to report that the road, with the exception of a few miles not yet improved, was found in good condition, and motorists were daily making the run of about ninety miles in four hours, and I feel sure that by the fall of 1922 when the additional few miles have been attended to, the road will be as good as any gravel road in the country.

The prejudice against N. B. roads and the traffic laws in the United States, is generally being overcome by the "good roads policy" of our minister of public works, and as the knowledge of the improvement in the N. B. roads reaches the people of the eastern states, we may look for an increased number of motor visitors, especially after we have effected the change in our rule of the road.

Resolutions were adopted and the suggestion made that the boards of trade be asked to co-operate with the association in its publicity work. The advantages to both the towns and province as a whole were clearly explained by Mr. Allan.

### MISSING FOR TWO MONTHS, IS ALL RIGHT

Acton, Ont., June 7.—The people of Acton and vicinity, who for the last two months have been greatly agitated by the strange disappearance of John McKinnon, a young farmer, from his homestead, were relieved when news reached the town this week that he was alive and well. The information was contained in a letter sent to his friend Harry Gordon, and was from a town in western Canada. Evidently the young man became alarmed at the publicity given his disappearance, and was anxious to let the public know that he had been a victim of foul play or of employment in the swamps adjacent to his farm, as was feared.

The information contained in the letter did not disclose the reasons for his sudden departure from the Ryder farm he had so recently purchased, and which he was getting into shape, in addition to furnishing the home in preparation of his marriage, that was to have taken place about three weeks from the date in April last when he disappeared. Mr. Gordon showed the letter from McKinnon to chief Constable J. J. Cooney, D. C. M., and that officer reported the matter to the provincial authorities. It was not considered advisable to make known the whereabouts of McKinnon at the present time.
