

The plans now divulged by Promoter Cochran reveal an undertaking which has no parallel in puglistic history. Promoter Rickard's daring enterprise at Toledo will be small in comparison. Already a new record for ring purses has been set. A new high-water mark in gate receipts is essential if success is to attend the venture, and to attain this new record an unprecedented attendance must'be obtained.

The popularity of Dempsey as champion, Carpentier's remarkable ring and war record and the esteem in which he is universally held, the present popularity of boxing and the character of the promoters, Rickard, Brady and Cochran, all indicate that this will be forthcoming.

As late as Friday when articles for the bout were formally signed, there was no change in this anouncement, although popular opinion was that there was little chance of the contest being held in Havana. Promoter Rickard, when asked after the signing of articles if he had definitely discarded the Cuban proposal said he still had the matter under consideration.

All Records Will Fall.

all indicate that this will be forthcoming.

It is probable that the arena for the bout will be erected in a district just outside the city limits, where Fire Department restrictions will not prohibit the construction of a wooden structure. There are many favorable sites available with easy connection by autoroute and railroad.

Promoter Rickard has already had experience in erecting big outdoor arenas. At Toledo he built a special structure of this kind for the Dempsey-Willard bout, and he did the same thing for the Jeffries-Johnson match in 1910. Such an undertaking does not necessarily entail a prospective financial burden since the lumber and other material necessary would be used for just one occasion and could easily be resold.

With an arena to hold 100,000 persons, an average of \$10 a head, if a capacity crowd was attracted, would mean a million dollars. A scale of prices ranging from \$5 to \$50 probably will prevail. Remuneration from concessionaires for various privileges in connection with the bout would increase this revenue, and the moving-picture rights, prospectively yielding several hundred thousand dollars, would be still another source of income for the promoters.
