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CONFERENCE ON VETO.

Several Points of Agreement Have Been Reached.

London, July 28.—The conference of the two dominant parties who are trying to compose the constitution differences of the House of Lords and the House of Commons already have succeeded in bringing several points that have separated them, and a statement made by Premier Asquith in the lower chamber yesterday afternoon indicates that the outlook for a compromise is more hopeful than had been anticipated.

Unless a rupture occurs during the recess little further of an official character is likely to be heard regarding the negotiations until Parliament re-assembles on Nov. 15.

Mr. Asquith, after stating that the conferees in the course of twelve meetings had surveyed the field of controversy carefully, said:

"The result is that our discussions made such progress—although we have not so far reached an agreement—as to render it in the opinion of all of us not only desirable but necessary that they should continue. We would think it wrong at this stage to break them off."

The Premier added that if further deliberations showed no prospects of an agreement that could be announced in Parliament at the present session, the conferees would be closed.

The bill modifying the declaration on religion required of the King upon accession passed the House of Commons upon third reading yesterday by a vote of 225 to 52. In its final form the bill not only eliminates the phrases offensive to the Roman Catholic subjects of His Majesty, but it also makes it acceptable to the non-conformists by striking out the proposed statement of adherence to the established church. King George is now required to declare merely that he is a "faithful Protestant."

Canadians Did Not Suffer.

New York, July 30.—According to Dr. F. S. Pearson, London and Paris, but not Canadian interests were active in the so-called Pearson syndicate, whose operations in American railroad stocks were so sensationally disclosed when Kuhn, Loeb & Co. took over the bulk of its holdings recently, it being later intimated that features of the syndicate's ambitious transcontinental railroad scheme might yet be carried through.

Mr. Pearson, head of the syndicate, discussed yesterday the parts which he himself, his associate, Percival Farquhar, played in the syndicate and the operations of the syndicate as a whole.

"I do not see that any harm can come from my telling you that London and Paris were the financial centres of the syndicate," said he. "Some of my Paris associates with Mr. Farquhar, banker, and financiers connected with the Banque de Paris and the Societe Generale, were interested in the syndicate and further that they are still interested in the syndicate."

"Then the Transcontinental Railroad project is not dead," was asked.

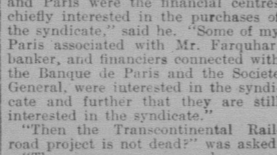
"There never was any such purpose as a transcontinental railroad in our minds," said Dr. Pearson. "Our purpose was solely to take an interest in such railroads as had a good future. We hoped to build them up and develop them."

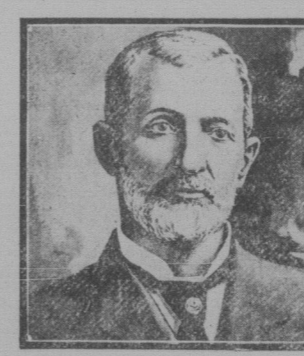
Jeanne moves about the room, discovering fresh delights at every turn, and presently comes upon a pianette standing in a recess.
