THE AUTOMOBILE QUESTION. The committee on bills reported having prepared a bill relating to automobiles. This report was received and the bill read. The particulars of this bill have already been published. During the discussion some of the members carefully avoided the words automobile and chaffeur and used things and driv-

Coun. Maxwell thought the Council had no right to make a law for the licensing of automobiles under which he fees for machines owned in St. John would go to the county funds. only ones the Council should deal with are those owned in the county. It should also regulate the speed of such vehicles in the county. But the county had no right to interfere with the privileges of the city.

Coun. Christie believed that no great harm has been done in the past, and that if the bill were delayed for more mature judgment, no harm would 14 done. The city has no right to regulate speed for autos in the county nor the county for the city. Then there is talk of persons being properly qualified to run these machines. NEWCASTLE, Jan. 17 .- The Sun's correspondent, in conversation with one or two prominent liberals, learned that it was their intention to endeavor to have the government make Newcastle

There have been a good many accirailway men are of the opinion that they are entirely due to the long run. The men are overworked, and conse no other portion of the I. C. Back in the eighties Newcastle was a divisional point. At that time over 120 railway men were registered in the town. Today a divisional centre here would mean at least 200 men, and its adoption as great a boon to the town as the establishment of a factory.



VICTORIA HOSPITAL

Strong Statements Made Against Management.

Appointment of an Auditor an Interesting Task-Institution However Got its Annual Grant.

FREDERICTON, Jan. 18.—The York County Council had a most lively and interesting session today and much enjoyed by the large number of spectators present. Three important matters were considered, the grant to the Victoria hospital, the appointment of an auditor and the grant to the Exhibition Association.

The first question taken up was the annual grant of \$500 to the Victoria hospital. The councillors expressed very strong opinions against renewing such a grant and some of them told or made very strong statements against the institution and its management. A resolution was finally brought forward to the effect that the grant should only be made on condition that legislation be sought to charge the institution so that anybody giving \$250 should have a right to elect a trustee. The discussion on this resolution had reached its highest point at 11 o'clock, when it was transferred until the afternoon in order that the order of the day should be taken up, namely the appointment of an auditor This was a jump from the frying pan to the fire. Two gentlemen were r inated for the position, H. F. McLeod and F. H. Peters. Before the vote was taken the ques

tion arose as to the qualification of the candidates and the secretary-treasurer gave the opinion that Mr. McLeod was not qualified. According to this ruling Mr. Peters was elected auditor, as he was the only qualified nominee, and not in favor of Mr. Peters and the ball was started. This was finally closed off by a motion to adjourn until two o'clock. On reassembling after dinner motion was presented to the effect that the morning's doings of the council in respect to the auditorship be rescinded. The resolution was a little peculiar as it should have stated to be correct that Mr. Peters' election be reconsidered. The motion was carried. Mr. Peters was then nominated and then Mr. McCready, the present auditor, and on the vote being taken Mr McCready was elected by a 2 to 1 vote The secretary-treasurer gave the opinion that the same gentleman may be a paid official of the county council and at the same time be the city clerk of Fredericton. This settled the auditorship and Mr. McCready was de-
