profession generally and necessarily proceeded, unimpeded by a war towards the resolutions be proposed on the part of the Government of New Brunswick by the most sanguine expectations of all persons.

Mr. Brown spoke truthfully for once: there can scarcely be a doubt but he has succeeded even beyond his own expectations, for it is not every Governor that can manage to extract from "all classes of his Majesty's subjects" three or four thousand pounds per annum, over and above his salary.

There follows the most fulsome eulogiums about his conduct on the Hebrides affairs, in which he is complimented with his "Dear General Scott," for which they are both to be lauded throughout the world (and I suppose to the end of the world) as the benefactors of mankind!

There comes the astounding fact, that "the bravest man in Ireland from his grand eminence with out promotion and without a hearing" "A hard case indeed!" a most unexpected event, which came upon the Province like a thunderbolt, or an earthquake.

Who would have thought our Legislators would do so much in a few days! to deprive their own people of their legislative commissions, and their only protection from contingencies? Verily, it overwhelmed them like an earthquake.

And what is the assigned cause? nothing but writing a conciliatory letter to the Governor of Maine! Nothing but corresponding with his Excellency, and commencing the conduct of his superior! Nothing but a disposition to see Maine seized on the whole, and to settle it with a hostile population! Very hard indeed that he should be recalled for this "prudent and judicious course."

Mr. Brown has either given a willful misrepresentation of facts, or he has lamentably forgotten the sentiments of our neighbours. I have referred for some years in the United States, and instead of talking back with pride upon the conduct of his superiors, he is now more than ever against Great Britain, that almost all who have the least mixture of French or German blood running in their veins claim descent from those countries, and deny their British origin together.

Mr. Brown's conduct is as follows: "What then shall be our duty as Members of the House? As Representatives of the People of this Province—we shall, under such circumstances, send our honour and credit to the wind. No, by no means. Let our farwily Addresses tell his Majesty the Queen how highly we estimated his faithful services, and let that address be accompanied with such testimonials, as shall stand before the world a complete demonstration of our sincerity.
