CROSSED THE LINE

Nikola Petroff, a Hungarian Workman, Killed at Fairville Yesterday Morning—Clay Slid Down.

Nikola Petroff, a Hungarian, was killed while working at the new siding being laid by the C. P. R. into the yard of the Partington Pulp and Paper Company at Fairville.

The unfortunate man was helping in the work of removing the bed under the old siding and loading a car with the clay as it was being removed, and as he was working from the bottom of them he fell and was crushed by the clay against the car. His fellow workmen rushed to his assistance and dug him out, but he was then unconscious. The accident occurred about half past ten yesterday morning. After the clay was removed from the position he was in, Doctor McCarthy was summoned to attend him. Nothing could be done for him, however, and he died after eleven o'clock. Coroner F. L. Kenney gave permission for the body to be removed to the undertaker's.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the District Office of the Local Agent of the District. Entry by proxy may be made in certain cases (not sub-agent) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of 100 acres or more, or on a homestead of 40 acres, if a habitable house is required in every case, except when residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price for a homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of 100 acres or more, or on a homestead of 40 acres, if a habitable house is required in every case, except when residence is performed in the vicinity.

U.S. SENATORS OPPOSE PLAN TO REDUCE THE NUMBER OF REGIONAL BANKS TO FOUR—EXPECT ACTION.

Washington, Nov. 4.—The movement for a Senate democratic caucus to discuss the Administration Currency Bill gained momentum today in the gossip among the few senators left in Washington. Dissatisfaction with the tentative decision of the banking and currency committee to reduce from twelve to four the number of regional banks planned in the new system was given as the ground for the proposal to call a caucus. This decision of the committee has aroused those senators who are most ardent in support of the administration plan.

"Some of the Democrats outside of the banking and currency committee are anxious to know just what the committee is doing," said Senator Hoke Smith, of Georgia, today. "For that reason a caucus has been suggested as a means of informing the Democrats as to what is going on. I think a caucus would impress the members with the strength of the opposition to the reduction of the number of regional banks to four. There should be eight or nine banks and we will not consent to a lesser number."

Senator Smith said he did not think any attempt would be made to make the caucus binding on democratic senators to vote for any particular bill.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be obtained on a tract of 40 acres or more, at an annual rental of \$1 an acre. Not more than 3,000 acres can be leased to one person. The rental is \$100 per acre per year. The tract is unimproved territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person and personal application to the District Engineer of the Department for the district must in all cases be made and the rental for the claim may be paid to the District Engineer within thirty days after filing application.

Persons holding eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery of coal on a tract of 40 acres or more, may apply for a lease. The rental is \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 25 per cent after the first year. The lease may be extended or paid off and other requirements completed by the claim may be purchased at \$1 an acre.

McINTYRE CASE UP WHEN PRISONER'S COUNSEL READY—TRAVIS TO BE TRIED AGAIN.

The November sitting of the County Court opened yesterday morning. His Honor Judge Forbes presiding. The docket was unusually small, there being but one civil case entered for trial and no criminal business. No grand jury had been summoned. The depositions in the case of the King vs. McIntyre, charged with the theft of \$10,000 from the Bank of Nova Scotia had been received and His Honor instructed the clerk to require from the counsel for the defendant if the prisoner would elect to be tried without a jury. In view of the confession produced in the police court he would, he said, dispose of the case at any time that was suitable to the prisoner's counsel.

In the case of the King vs. Thompson, assault, J. A. Barry representing the attorney general, said that it was the intention of the Crown to have a new trial.

A. A. Wilson, K. C., who appeared for the prisoner at the last court, when the jury disagreed, said that the defendant was not in court because he understood he was not to appear until called for. Instructions were given to have Thompson appear in court Monday morning at 11 o'clock.

In the case of the King vs. Charles Boylan, assault, in which the defendant skipped his bail, the sureties, Alfred Brennan and Arthur F. Cassidy were called upon to produce the defendant and Mr. Barry announced that failing this, he would move for forfeiture of bail at the end of the court.

The only civil case in the jury cause of James F. Sheppard vs. Wm. Stevens, in which the record is filed by Dr. W. B. Wallace, K. C.

The naturalization papers of Joseph Doria and Jacob M. Tanzman were read by W. H. Harrison.

The petit jurors are D. Arnold Fox, James A. Cooper, Thos. Cogger, Jr., Roy W. Giger, Michael J. L. Mulholland (absent), George D. Wanamaker (excused), Robt. D. Campbell, Douglas Malcolm (absent), Frank S. Alwood, Frederick R. Paterson, R. M. Barisch, J. M. Scovill, Jr., Frank A. Kinneer, William F. Rhea, Richard N. Dean, John R. Cummings, John T. McGowan, A. Chip Ritchie, Walter F. Sproul (absent), David I. Soules, Roy L. Sipprell.

The court adjourned until ten o'clock on Monday morning.

The Travis Case. At the adjourned circuit before Mr. Justice White, yesterday morning, in the case of the King vs. John Travis, J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., who appeared for the attorney general, said that the intention of the Crown was to try the prisoner again on the charge of breaking and entering Estey and Company's premises in Dock street. The court was adjourned sine die and the next trial will take place before Judge McKeown at the November circuit.

In Chambers. In the case of the Murray Printing Company Limited vs. the Father Morrissey Medicine Company, Limited, on application of E. C. Weyman for the plaintiff, an order was granted by Mr. Justice McKeown for a commission to issue to take the evidence of W. S. Murray and others in Toronto. J. H. F. Teed opposed the application.

TWO CASES OF THEFT IN UNION STATION

Two cases of theft in the Union Depot supposed to have occurred last night have been reported to the police. One in that of a young English girl, Miss Clara Mason, and the other that of Charles Buchanan, who fell asleep in the waiting room while waiting for the midnight train to take him to Amherst. He says he was robbed of \$170. He says he had seventeen \$10 notes pinned on the inside of his shirt and that when he awoke from his while he slept. Policeman Scovill Smith of the I. C. R. happened along and placed him under arrest, charging him with drunkenness, though the prisoner said he had not been drinking. An effort is now being made by the police to get some trace of the lost notes.
