COMMON COUNCIL
SPECIAL MEETING
Commissioner Fisher at a special
meeting of the common council on Sat-
urday morning introduced a resolution
that the paving of streets be done out
of the general assessment and has
seemingly abandoned the idea of doing
any work under the local improvement
act.

The council first went into commit-
tee and Commissioner Fisher present-
ed a petition from the property own-
ers of Douglas Avenue, protesting
against the application of the local im-
provement act, either for paving or
laying of curbing. He then moved
that all paving in the future be done
from general assessment.

Mayor Hayes said St. John was the
only city on the continent in which
the property owners did not contrib-
ute for pavements.
On the motion being put it was car-
ried, Mayor Hayes and Commissioner
Bullock voting nay.

Commissioner Fisher remarked that
if he could not get a bond issue, Prince
William Street could not be paved this
year.

The commissioners then rose from
council into council and granted per-
mission to the Y. W. C. A. to erect an
electric sign on King street.
Commissioner Bullock referred to
some friction between the city and
marine department over the collection
of wharf charges on west side and said
it might be necessary to go to court
to settle the matter.

CANADA LIFE ANXIOUS
TO HELP VETERANS
President H. C. Cox of the Canada
Life Assurance Company recently gave
an interview to the press, stating that
so far the company had only had the
opportunity of securing five of their
old home office employees back from
the military who had proceeded over-
seas.

"The principle adhered to," con-
tinued Mr. Cox, "will be to give the
men as nearly as possible the same
work. We are even going further than
that; we have of late been advertis-
ing the services of returned men
who have selling ability and we in-
tend to give them a course of instruc-
tion in life insurance salesmanship.
The technical nature of our business
and the special aptitude required will
of course defer many returned men
from taking up our work, but we have
been quite successful in many cases."

"In connection with this program,"
continued Mr. Cox, "we are empha-
sizing the need for a better educated
man because that is what he has been
used to and what most of the men
when they return home would econ-
omize. The company's policy will sim-
ply be to do everything we can to har-
monize the condition of the veteran
with the requirements of our organiza-
tion."

"As we see it," said Mr. Cox, in
conclusion, "the repatriation system
mainly consists of fitting the return-
ed man back to his old job, and I ven-
ture to say that if this view of the
situation were duplicated throughout
the whole national industrial system,
the problem would solve itself within
the year."

The schooner George Melville Coch-
ran, abandoned one day out of St.
John, bound for Boston, Mass., was
insured for \$100,000, one-fifth being
placed with a Halifax company and
the balance with Upper Canadian and
American companies.

Sailed Yesterday.
The S. S. War Beetle sailed yester-
day for Falmouth, loaded with grain;
the Australian barkentine Westfield
also sailed for Melbourne, her home
port, with a large general cargo,
mostly steel products.

Lord Dufferin Bunk.
The S. S. Lord Dufferin was rammed
in the port quarter last Friday by the
monstrous ship Aquila, off Liberty
Island, New York, and sank in 36 feet
of water, 15 minutes after the acci-
dent, which was caused by a heavy
fog and a strong ebb tide. One mem-
ber of the crew, an older native of
New York, was killed, and several
were injured, but not seriously. The
Lord Dufferin was of 4,604 tons gross,
and was carrying a cargo of raw
sugar to this port, where a cargo of
lumber awaited her.

Harry W. Lewis Lost.
The three-masted schooner Harry
W. Lewis, of 277 tons, built at Hope-
well Cape, N.B., just thirty years ago,
ran into heavy weather on her last
trip from Gulfport, Mississippi to Hay-
ti, lost her deck load along with a
portion of her cargo, and was wrecked
on her plugging and sprang a leak. As
soon as the vessel became unmanage-
able the master, Capt. Howard Tay-
lor, of Economy, N.S., abandoned her
and took to the boats with his crew.
They were picked up by a passing
steamer and landed safely at Charle-
stown, South Carolina. The Lewis was
a familiar craft in this harbor sev-
eral years ago, but was rebuilt some
time ago and registered for West In-
dia trade.

Halifax Feels Sore.
It is understood that three more
steamers, that sailed from trans-
Atlantic ports last month for Hal-
ifax for orders, have been ordered to
proceed to either St. John or Port-
land for their cargoes. The War
Siren, which sailed from Canary Is-
lands on February 9th, is understood
to be proceeding to either St. John
or Portland. The Elswick Prince,
which recently sailed from Gibraltar
for Halifax has been ordered to go to
St. John, and the Tiffin, which sailed
from Gibraltar on February 8th, has
been directed to proceed to the new
Brunswick port—Halifax Chron.
