Halifax, N.S., April 10.—The Halifax, Trades and Labor Council proposes establishing a labor party journal in this city, the first number to be out about May first. The committee to whom the matter was entrusted, reports as follows:

"As the trend of the times show in the government of this country, as it other countries, and as the organized workers have no way in which to place their views before the public, therefore, the need of a labor paper in Halifax is very urgent."

The committee asked that the council endorse the labor paper, which would be published in the interests of the Halifax Trades and Labor Council, and would be the mouth-plece of labor in this jurisdiction. The report asked that a committee be appointed from the council to proceed; immediately, with the publication. The executive committee was instructed to take the matter in hand.


