



Gravensteins are being largely bought by an American buyer, who is paying \$3 a barrel. This looks like high prices for winter fruit in the British markets.

Some idea of what was required to feed 3,550 men in camp at Kentville during the past two weeks is given by the following figures: To feed the men it required 144 barrels of flour, 7,200 pounds of bacon, 720 bushels of potatoes, 3,600 pounds of split peas, 4,800 pounds of beans, 42,600 pounds of oats, 75,000 pounds of hay, and used 34,000 pounds of straw. The twelve days' baking required 144 cords of hard wood.
