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Sussex, England, March 26th, 1834, and died at Port Monton, Queen's County, Nova Scotia, Oct. 28th, 1871.

At the age of six years he came from England to Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, where, in his sixteenth year, he was converted to God under the ministry of the Rev. F. Smallwood. In 1861 he offered himself as a candidate for our Ministry and was accepted. He preached the Gospel with earnestness and fervency, and God gave him many souls as seals to his Ministry. His career was short, but useful. Robust in health, abundant in labors, and with bright prospects before him of serving his Master in the cause ever dear to his heart, death overtook him and his sun went down while it was yet day. Jesus, whose name he loved to speak in the sinner's ear and dwelt upon his tongue when battling with the tide of death, sustained him in his dying moments. When asked, "Are you sure of a mansion prepared for you?" he answered, " Yes, for me !"

By those who knew and loved him he was laid down by the side of two of his brethren in the Cemetery of Liverpool, Nova Scotia, in the belief that when the trumpet sounds, he will have a resurrection into eternal life.

4. ROBERT E. CRANE, — who was born in Horton, Nova Scotia, in the year 1818. Though nurtured and trained amid the evangelical influences of Methodism, he did not give his heart to God until the period of manhood. He was led to the Saviour under the preaching of that faithful man of God, the Rev. Wm. Croscombe, during
