BRITAIN AND RUSSIA SIGN TRADE PACT

NOT EXPECTED **ESTIMATES EDUCATION**

SPRING PLOWING

TRADE RELATIONS BETWEEN GT. BRITAIN AND RUSSIA ARE TO BE RESUMED AT

Commercial Agreement Between Two Countries Is Signed Today—Russia to Cease Spreading Soviet Propaganda Outside That Country's Boundaries, While Britain Will Observe Neutrality Regarding Internal Russian Affairs -London Newspapers Hold Different Opinions As To New Contract.

London, March 16 .- The trade agreement under which commercial relations will be resumed by Great Britain and Russia was signed here this morning by the governments of the two countries.

It was reported the board of trade, after having carried on negotiations with Leonid Krassin, representative of the Russian Bolshevik Government, had rewritten several clauses which had presented considerable difficulty in the past. The principle that Russia will cease all propaganda outside of that country, and that Great Britain will observe neutrality regarding Russian internal affairs, was given due recognition in the clauses which were altered. The fact that the trade agreement was to be signed revived in this morning's newspapers the controversy regarding the Bolsheviki Reported to Have expediency of such a move.

The Morning Post, in an editorial captioned "The Unclean The Morning Post, in an editorial captioned The Orietan Thing," vehemently inveighed against the agreement, and argued that its signature would "inevitably involve recognition of the soviet regime, which is blackened by every crime, and the agents of which are actively plotting the destruction of every civilized state."

"Under this agreement," the newspaper continued, "British traders eventually will become receivers of stolen goods."

Measure which Aid. Wenige will introduce this afternoon is very uncertain. If it is decided to adopt the new time for the summer months an effort will be made to secure uniformity with other municipalities contemplating the other municipalities contemplating the change.

The Railway Association of Canada, in a letter to the council, urges that particular attention be paid to this point. They suggest that all the cities which adopt daylight saving advance their clocks one hour on Sunday, May 1, and return to the old time on Sunday, October 2. The general change of time on the Canadian railways is to be made on these dates. If London

If London and other municiplities considering daylight saving also accept them, in addition to the greater convenience which this would mean to travelers, it would enable business people generally to have a better understanding as to when the business day commenced and ended in other municipalities with which they are constantly in communication.

Last year there was much confusion. London used standard time. Toronto adopted daylight saving on May 2 and reverted to standard time on September 12. Montreal adopted it on May 2 and reverted on October 3; Ottawa, May 2 to October 2; Guelph, May 15 to September 12; Gait, May 23 to September 15; Brockville, June 1 to October 31.

Copenhagen, March 16.—Fifty thousand men have been gathered at the Russian fortress at Kronstadt, and this number is increasing dally, says a Helnumber is increasing daily, says a Helsingfors dispatch, quoting a Red Cross worker who has just arrived there from Kronstadt. An organization of Russian emigrants in this city has been informed in a wireless dispatch that Kronstadt is receiving necessary provisions and has sufficient ammunition for three years.

Victor T. Tchirnoff, who was minister of agriculture in the Kerensky cabinet in 1917, was the organizer of the counter-revolution, it is declared by he Politiken. He is reported negotiating with the right wing of the Bolsheviki with a view to making the methods of the Soviet Government more democratic.

London March 16.—Leon Trotzky, Russian Soviet war minister, declared in an interview given in Moscow that "all talk of a rising in Petrograd and a bombardment of the town is a silly fiction," says a wireless dispatch from the Soviet capital today.
"Petrograd is just as impregnable against a counter-revolutionary coup d'etat as it is to the Kronstadt fortress." Trotzky asserted. "Liquidation of the rising has been dragged out because we wish to avoid severe losses, not only to our troops, but to the insurrectionists in the Kronstadt garrison. Up to the present our losses have been insignificant."
