immediately preceding the date of application, with the remaining four either in the Union or some other part of the British Empire, or he must have been in the service of the Crown, e.g. in the Army, Navy or Civil Service, for a period of five years during the eight years immediately preceding the date of application for naturalization.

The effect of naturalization under Act No. 16 of 1926 is as follows:

- (a) A person naturalized under this Act becomes, unless the law provides otherwise, entitled to all the rights, powers and privileges and subject to all the obligations of a natural-born British subject, throughout the British Empire, the Dominions and Dependencies, except in those Dominions which have not adopted Part 2 of the British Nationality and Aliens Act, 1914-22.
- (b) The wife of a person naturalized under the said

 Act acquires the same status as a naturalized

 British subject as her husband.
- (c) The minor children who are aliens of a person naturalized under the said Act become naturalized only if their names are specifically included in the parents' naturalization certificate. Such
