As you know, the Japanese Government have approached the Vatican with a view to the appointment of a Japanese representative there. The United Kingdom and the United States Governments have been doing their best to persuade the Pope not to receive him but, from a statement made in New York yesterday by Archbishop Spellman, who has been Vatican spokesman on this continent before, it looks very much as though the Vatican has decided to receive a Japanese envoy.

A Ministry of Information telegram, received this afternoon through the Office of the United Kingdom High Commissioner, contains the following paragraph:

"Vatican State. Negotiations are now in progress for establishing diplomatic relations with Japan and until a definite decision is reached we are confining ourselves to expressing surprise that the Vatican should contemplate such a step at this juncture. Should the establishment of diplomatic relations be announced we propose to take the line here that the news has created a most painful impression, that the United Kingdom Government find it difficult to reconcile such a step with the Vatican's frequently expressed anxieties regarding the extensions of the war and that the appointment of a Japanese Representative cannot fail to be interpreted as a condonation of Japan's treacherous and unprofoked attack and the result of Axis pressure."

It is unfortunate that the Vatican appears to have yielded to enemy pressure in receiving a Japanese envoy at this time, but I can see no useful purpose served and possibly some harm done by our countenancing a press quarrel with the Pope.
