## An Open Letter to the Battalion

## To

The Officers, Non-commissioned Officers and Men of the Duke of Connaught's Own, 158th (Overseas) Battalion.

## Gentlemen:-

With this souvenir issue of The Reveille, it gives me extreme pleasure to have the opportunity of expressing to all ranks of the 158th (Overseas) Battalion, The Duke of Connaught's Own, my hearty appreciation of the splendid devotion you have shown to the work in hand.

Fresh from the varied walks of civil life, you have caught the true soldierly spirit. The transformation from civil to military life and discipline has been complete, and so far you have done your duty nobly.

The end of the first step—the drudgery of our training—has been reached. Your ready response and general desire for fitness and efficiency augurs well for success in the strenuous grind awaiting us at the Concentration Camp, where the second step of our journey to the Front must be completed.
